All Upset

Quick Cakes Among Popular Recipes; Many Variations Are Possible

The one time it saves energy to upset things is with good old upside down desserts. The cook produces a decorated and iced cake inexpensively and with a minimum of effort. Pineapple upside down cake, probably the founder of the family, remains one of the most popular members of the clan, but there are many variations one may make. The first of those we'll publish today is one which uses canned fruit—certainly practical for mid-winter menus:

PEACH UPSIDE DOWN CAKE

2 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup shortening
3/4 cup milk
1 egg, well beaten
3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
2 tablespoons melted butter
9 canned peach halves, well drained

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse meal. Combine milk and egg. Add liquid to dry ingredients; mix only until flour is dampened. Melt butter in 8x8x2-inch square pan. Cover with brown sugar. Arrange peach halves in bottom of pan, cut-side down. Spread batter over fruit. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for 25 minutes. Turn upside down on serving plate. Decorate with maraschino cherries, if desired. Serve warm with cream. Serves 9.

The combinations of gingerbread and applesauce has long been a favorite one, so this recipe that uses both is also in favor:

GINGERBREAD UPSIDE DOWN CAKE

1 cup brown sugar
3 tablespoons butter
Sliced apples
Simmer in frying pan until melted. Remove pan from stove and arrange apples in it. Pour the cake mixture over it.
1/4 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 unbeat egg
1/2 cup sour milk
1/2 cup molasses
1 teaspoon soda in the milk
1 1/2 cups flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 teaspoons ginger
3/4 teaspoon salt
Work butter and flour together, add-dry ingredients and sour milk,

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mix well, add egg and molasses and beat well. Bake 45 minutes at 375 degrees.

Or use any gingerbread batter. Any number of combinations can be made using the batter from the above peach upside down cake. Dried fruits such as apricots or peaches and prunes can be arranged attractively and topped with the batter. Pears either canned or fresh, berries or other fruits may also be used. In this case, first melt brown sugar and butter in the skillet or pan before putting in the fruit.

Bids Asked for South Salem Postal Branch

New bids for a branch post-office in south Salem, similar to four others on the outskirts of Salem, are being sought through advertising. Postmaster Albert C. Gragg announced Thursday. Previous bids for the station were rejected by the postoffice department as unsatisfactory. Deadline for entry of bids is 4 p. m. February 10.

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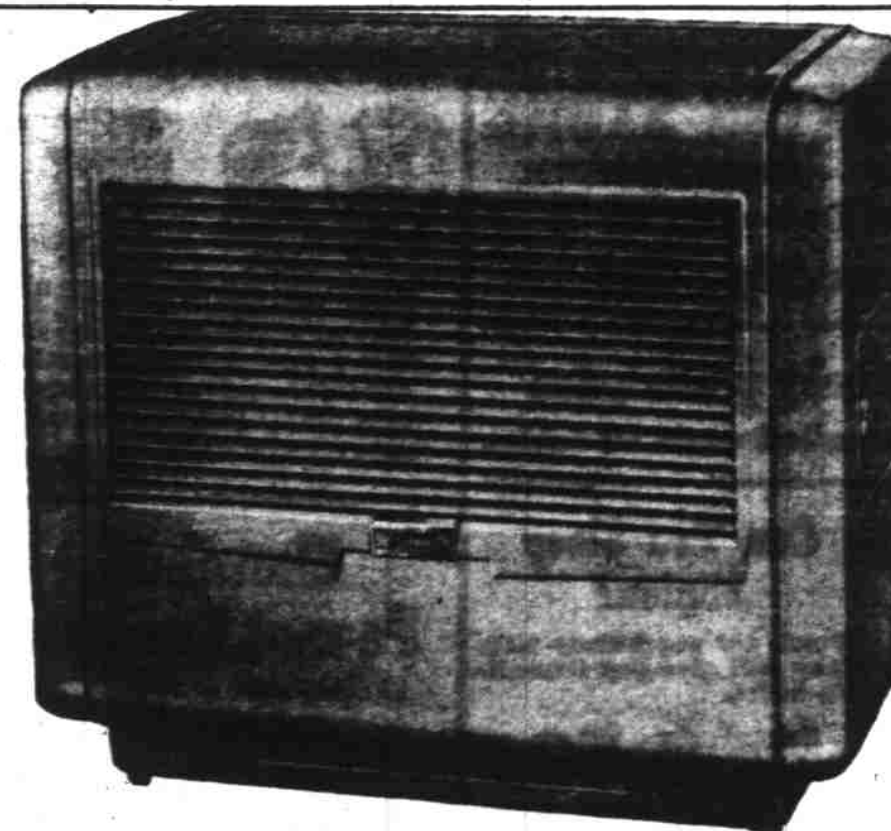
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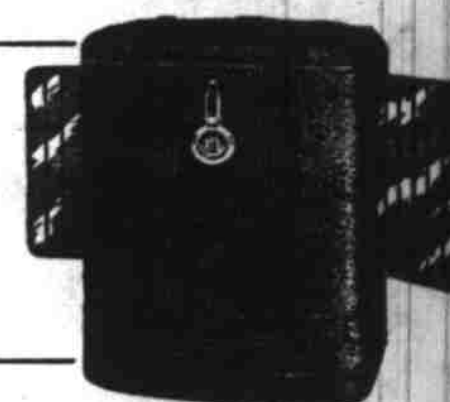
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
