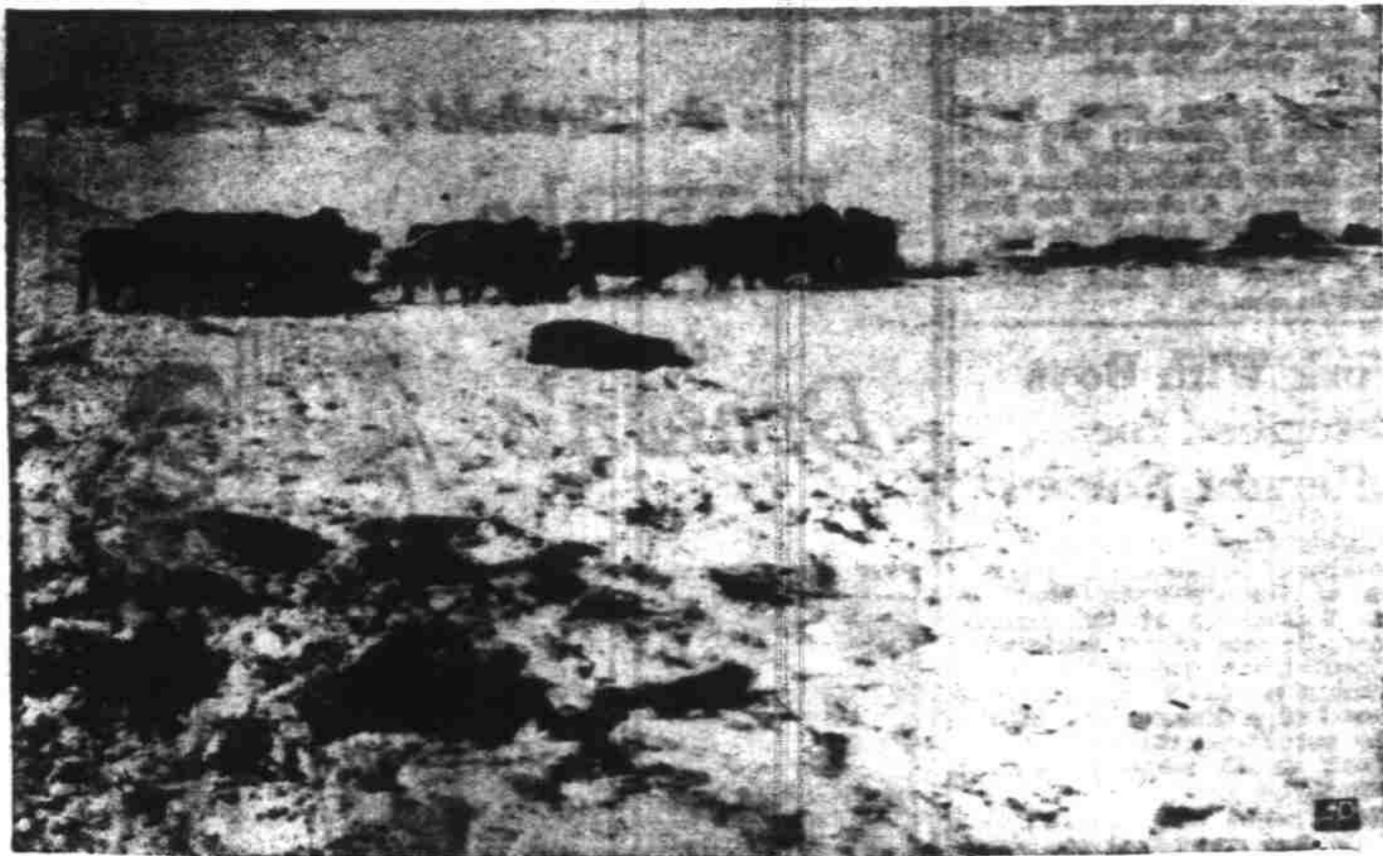
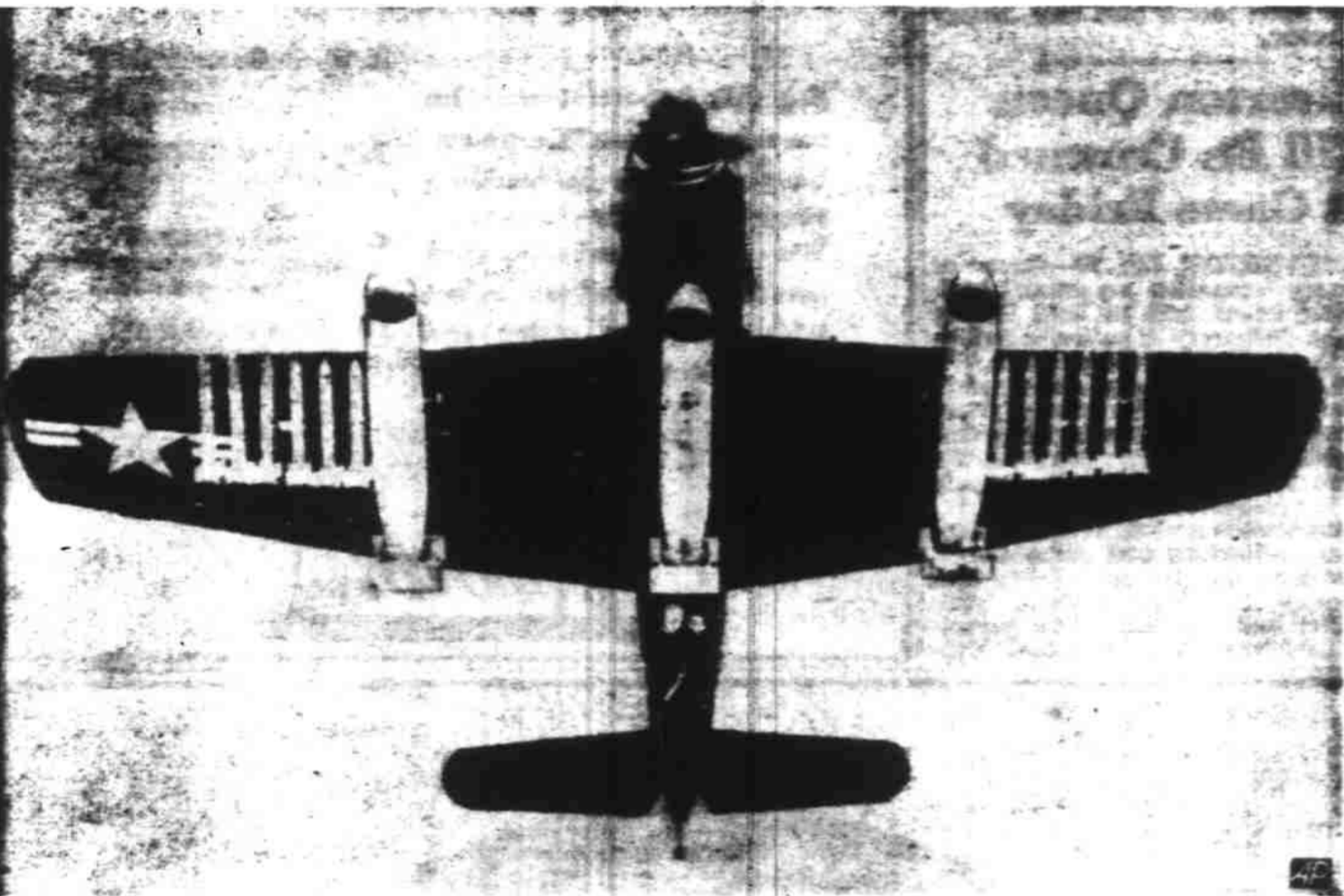


Cattle Feed on Haylift Fodder

Here's 'Able Mabel' in Flight



SAN DIEGO, Jan. 29.—Here's the Navy's new one-man attack plane, dubbed by carrier pilots "Able Mabel," in flight with a 9,000 pound pay load. The craft is carrying three full-size torpedoes, 12 five-inch rockets and four 20 mm aerial cannon. The gross weight of the plane thus loaded is more than 25,000, but it can take off with a gross weight of more than 20,000 pounds. The meeting has been called by the board of directors.

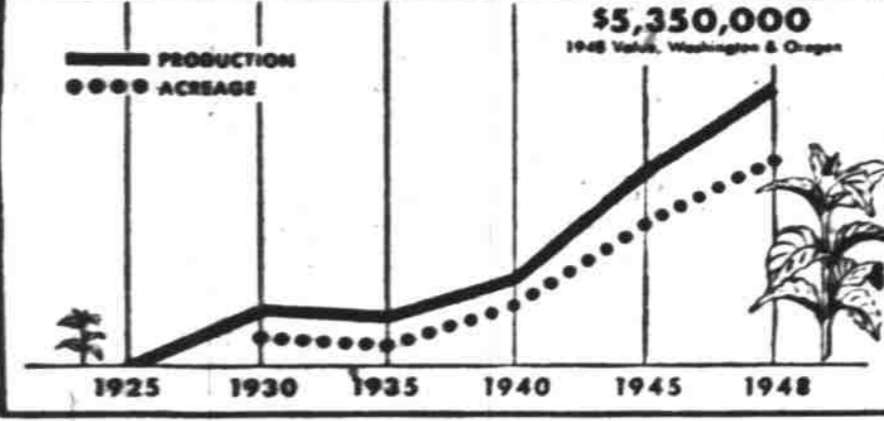

Mint Becoming Major Oregon Crop



MORE THAN HALF the national total of peppermint oil is now produced in the Pacific Northwest, where peppermint has become a more valuable crop than any other fresh vegetable. Starting from nothing in 1925, peppermint plantings in Washington and Oregon reached 16,400 acres and production reached more than 800,000 pounds, worth \$5,350,000, in 1948. A new \$100,000 rectifying plant is now being operated by I. P. Callison & Sons at Chehalis, Wash., and produces scientifically rectified types and blends of peppermint flavor used in leading brands of chewing gum, dentifrices and candies.

New 'Still' for Peppermint Aids Industry

CHEHALIS, Wash., Jan. 29 (Special)—More than 2,000 residents of Washington and Oregon were here today to look at a new "fractionating still" that promises to make the Pacific Northwest the number one spot in the world for the production of quality peppermint oil.
The still was built to meet specifications set up during five years of research by the University of Washington School of Pharmacy and L. P. Callison and Sons, Northwest pharmaceutical manufacturers. Cost of the research totaled \$75,000 and construction costs of the still were \$100,000.
Last year's northwest peppermint crop, worth \$5,350,000, was more valuable than any single fresh vegetable or any processed vegetable except peas.
