


SAN DIEGO, Jan. 29-Here's the Navy's new one-man attack plane, dubbed by earrier pilots "Able Mand pay load. The craft is carrying three full-size torpedoes, 12 five-inch bel," in flight with a 9.960 pour rockets and four 20 mm aerial cannon. 


