Dr. Robert D. Gregg, dean of the school of liberal arts at Willamette university, will speak on "Two Worlds, Can They Be One?" at a meeting at the Knight Memorial church on Monday night, immediately following the annual dinner for members of the YWCA and their husbands. The meeting is open to the general public and will be in the church auditorium.

Dr. Gregg has traveled extensively, spending three summers in Europe, two trips to the Caribbean and attended the University of Mexico. He was chairman for four years of the foreign policy association in Pittsburgh. For two years he was co-chairman of the regional inter-American center, which was an organization affiliated with the office of the coordinator of Inter-American Affairs in Washington, D.C., concerned with community education and good neighborliness. Dr. Gregg is a Quaker, a graduate of Oberlin, John Hopkins and University of Michigan. For seventeen years he has been a member of the history department of the Carnegie Institute of Technology.
