 ALBANY — Mrs. Nancy Burkhart, 93, a resident of Oregon for 87 years, died here February 8 after long illness. Funeral services were held Thursday, February 10, the Rev. Roy Strong officiating, burial in Riverside.

Born in Unionville, Mo., Jan. 19, 1856, she came to Oregon in 1862. While the immigrant party was camped along the Platte river a band of Indians appeared, stampeding the cattle, and little Nancy was almost killed by the fleeing animals. Upon arriving in Oregon the Cooper family located at The Dalles, from there moving to Lebanon in 1866, and four years later moved to Albany where she resided since.

On March 31, 1872, Nancy Cooper married George W. Burkhart in Albany. Burkhart died Feb. 1, 1905. Mrs. Burkhart joined the United Presbyterian church in 1884.

Survivors are a daughter, Hettie O. Burkhart, and a brother, Harry L. Cooper, both of Albany.
