

Sheep Shearing School Scheduled For February 22

Four-H boys and their leaders will have a chance for sheep shearing instruction February 22 and 23 at the Pacific International Livestock Building, Anthol Riney, Marion county extension agent says this school is the "most educational activity carried out during the year."

E. A. Warner, livestock specialist for Sunbeam Corporation, furnishes equipment and instruction. Portland Union Stock Yards furnishes the sheep and 4-H boys and their leaders learn by doing the shearing.

Warner, who teaches the "Western" or "Australian" style of shearing, says, "A substantial part of the purpose of the shearing school is to remove the drudgery from shearing and to make it a simple and fascinating operation which anyone, willing to take instruction, can learn."

Four-H Boys and leaders interested in attending this free school are asked to confer with their county extension agent handling 4-H work. Reservations must be made in advance for dormitory rooms at the Imperial Hotel.

Plans have been completed by Cal Monroe, state agent (4-H) for tours through the Pacific Wool Growers Warehouse and a woolen mill. This will complete the picture of the handling of wool.

Earl Bleakney, star route, Silverton, attended the school last year and then sheared the family flock of eleven sheep. Warner encourages boys who are learning to repeat these schools just as a "refresher course."

Fire Equipment Election Planned For Silverton

SILVERTON, Feb. 12—A special election will be called later this spring to refer to the people the question of levying a 5 mill tax for a period of two years for the purpose of buying fire department equipment.

Included in the equipment requested by Fire Chief O. A. Hande is a 600 gallon pumper and chassis which would cost an estimated \$10,000, a hose for \$1,500 and a pumice block annex to the present city hall at approximately \$1,600. It was estimated that a two-year tax levy would bring in about \$13,000. City Attorney Rex Albright has been instructed to take the necessary steps for the special election. The city council has also taken action to set up a sinking fund for the fire department.

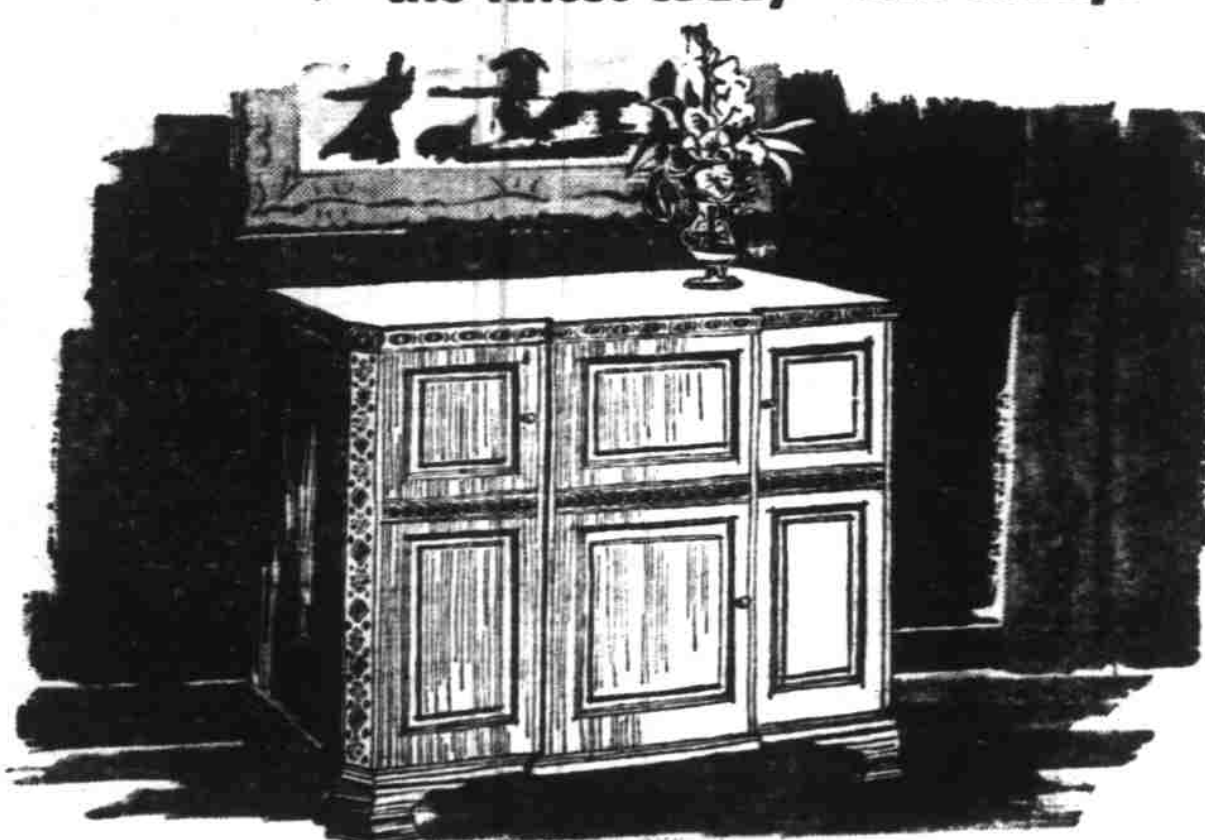
