

Bodies of 19 Mid-Valley Men To Return Here from Pacific

The bodies of 19 Marion, Polk and Linn county men killed in the South Pacific during World War II have been returned to the United States for burial, the department of the army announced Monday.

The remains, formerly interred in temporary military cemeteries on Iwo Jima, Tinian, Saipan, Saipan and Hawaii, arrived aboard the army transport *Delaware*, which carried 5,806 bodies. They were returned at the request of relatives.

Mata and Hari Performance Said Indescribably Hilarious

This is going to be a hard review to write; I'm still laughing at Mata and Hari.

The dancers who book themselves as "The Danced Theatre" have a company of very clever clowns. Their dance interpretations are the sort of entertainment one laughs at hilariously, then can't describe afterwards. Their humor depends on an expressive shrug of shoulders, a stumbling step, a missed cue.

The humor in their dances also comes from exaggerating certain familiar mannerisms or movements.

Their "Pas de Deux" was a burlesque of the famous Swan Lake ballet, ever to the swan. A rear view of the ballerina doing a typical flatfooted walk that follows a stunt on the toes, was one of the funniest incidents.

"In the Circus" was a real production with the clowns, zebra and lion, with the tamer, tumblers and acrobats. One seemed actually to see the trapeze act, in watching the clowns as they viewed the performers. Their tight rope act done on the ground, was another highlight of this number.

"Carnegie Hall" was a clever act. The two dancers were first the audience, then Hari acted as the director, then together they were the whole orchestra; harp, violins, horns and finally Hari played Mata as the bass fiddle.

"The Sports News Reel" took us through boxing, fencing, bowling, football and finally baseball, even to a free for all with the referee which had to be broken up by the pianist. This act ended by the spotlight blinking in a manner reminiscent of the old-time news reel.

"Hindu Fakir Show" was exaggerated movements of oriental dancers. "Guest Night at La Tropicana," "Penny Arcade" and "Can't Get Ripe on the Vines" blues were good too.

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WU Students Argue Reports On Activities

Willamette university speech students and staff members of the university newspaper went around and around in open debate Monday afternoon at Waller hall, and where they stopped nobody quite knows.

The meeting, brought about by drama and speech department expressions of dissatisfaction over their activity coverage in the Collegian, was conducted by Student Body President George Hurt, who allowed students from each side to let off steam.

The discussion was carried largely by Forensics manager Jack Gunn, representing drama and speech departments, and Eric Bergman and Eileen Scott, editor and news editor of the Collegian.

The "battle" revolved largely around speech department accusations of non-printing of a Pacific Coast speech tournament won by Willamette at College of Puget Sound February 12; printing of an alleged over-critical review of last week's drama department production, "R. U. R." by an ex-member of the drama department; and front page coverage of an attempted "disaffiliation" move from university sponsorship by members of the KOCO radio Workshop production. (Loring Schmidt manager of KOCO, said that the program had been discontinued temporarily after last week's Monday presentation by request of university officials.)

The Collegian editors replied to the accusations that there was not room in last Friday's edition of the Collegian for the speech story; that the play review was not over-critical or biased and that the Workshop's withdrawing from front page sponsorship was worth front page space as "news."

Requiem mass will be held today at 9:30 a.m. in St. Joseph's Catholic church for Mrs. Carrie E. Fisher, Salem resident for the past 50 years who died at her home Saturday at the age of 85 years. Interment will be in St. Barbara's cemetery.

Mrs. Fisher was born in Green Bay, Wis., March 6, 1863, and came to Oregon with her parents at the age of 12. She lived near Gervais for several years and was married to John B. Fisher at Gervais. They moved to Salem in 1900 and he died in 1927.

She was a member of the Catholic church in Salem and a member of the Altar society.

Survivors are the sons, Joseph J. Fisher, Portland and W. G. Fisher, Salem; sister, Mary Stevens, Gervais; brothers, Joseph Nys, Heppner, and Albert Nys, Brooks.

Civic Leaders To View Street Plan at Eugene

An official Salem party is being organized by Mayor R. L. Elstrom to study operation of one-way streets in Eugene, this week, in connection with this city's study of a state highway department proposal for a \$7,600,000 Salem highway and bridge improvement which calls for a one-way street system.

Elstrom is asking the city council, city zoning commission, long range planning commission and committees from North Salem Business association and South Salem Progress club to join in a bus trip to Eugene at 1:30 p. m. Thursday.

The mayor said an inspection of the Eugene street system will be followed by a dinner and forum meeting with Eugene Chamber of Commerce and city officials, including merchants whose places of business are directly affected by the one-way streets there.

Salem city council is to take action on the highway plan as proposed by Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock at a March 14 meeting in city hall.

Katherine Adlard, Dies After Illness, Was Nurse's Aide

Funeral services will be held Wednesday at 1:30 p. m. in the W. T. Ridgdon chapel for Katherine Adlard, 36, well-known Salem nurse's aide, who died Sunday after a long illness. Concluding services will be in Belcrest Memorial park.

Miss Adlard was one of the Pacific coast area nurse's aides placed on the national honor roll for her long hours of service during the war. Despite illness she gave 2,200 hours as a nurse's aide because of her brothers in the service.

In recent months she had been given 32 blood transfusions donated by Salem and Marion county friends.

Miss Adlard was born at Condon, Ore., Dec. 23, 1912, and had lived in Salem for many years.

Survivors are her father, Walter Roy Adlard, Salem; brothers, John A. Adlard, Corte Madera, Calif., and Othel Richard Adlard, Echo, Ore.

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
