Veterans Show Rising Interest In State Loans
War veterans are showing increased interest in the Oregon state veterans' farm and home loan, the state department of veterans' affairs reported Wednesday. Annual figures released by the department showed that 14,457 interviews in 1948 dealt with the \$6,000, 4 per cent loan program. Only 5,284 such interviews were conducted in 1947.

Other figures reveal that GI (federal) educational benefits ranked next to the loan program in importance to veterans, judging from the number of interviews. Apprenticeship training, employment problems, and state educational benefits followed. Altogether 27,898 interviews were conducted by the veterans department in the last two years on various veterans problems.

Load Limit Cut on Silver Falls Road
A 50 per cent reduction of the truck load limit on the Silver Falls highway between Shaw and Silverton went into effect this morning by order of the state highway commission.

The normal 72,000-pound gross load limit was slashed to 36,000 pounds and the axle limit from 16,000 to 8,000 pounds.

Mrs. Meyers Dies; Funeral Rites Today

Mrs. Milton L. Meyers, 75, long prominent in Salem civic affairs, died at her home, 1055 Court st., late Tuesday night following a cerebral hemorrhage.

Funeral services will be held this morning at 11:30 o'clock at the Clough-Barwick chapel with the Rev. George Swift officiating. Concluding services will be at Mt. Crest Abbey Mausoleum.

The deceased was the former Alice Steiner. Mrs. Meyers was born at Bluffton, Ohio, April 21, 1873. She came to Salem in 1887 with her parents, Gideon and Elizabeth Steiner.

She was married to Milton L. Meyers in Salem in 1898. The couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last year on September 28.

Mrs. Meyers was a charter member and a past matron of Chadwick chapter, Order of Eastern Star. She was active in this and a number of other organizations for many years. During the first world war she directed the surgical dressing department of the Red Cross here.

Mrs. Meyers, as a young woman, was one of the two first "telephone girls" at the Salem telephone exchange.

Surviving, besides the husband, are two nieces, Mrs. Daniel J. Fry of Salem and Mrs. Earl C. Fiegel of Portland, and a nephew, Dr. Milton B. Steiner of Portland.
