

Pay Boost for Legislators to Be Debated

The senate elections committee decided Monday to send the house-approved legislators' pay increase to the senate floor without recommendation.

The proposed constitutional amendment would give each legislator a salary of \$1,200 for each regular session, compared with the \$400 they get now.

The president of the senate and speaker of the house would get \$1,600 a session.

The measure also would repeal the 20-day limit on the length of special legislative sessions.

The committee recommended passage of senate bills to compel presidential and vice presidential candidates in the primary election to file expense statements.

The committee approved a bill to elect precinct committeemen at the May primary, instead of in the November general election as is done now.

Fur Raisers' Bill Passed in Senate

A bill to take certain fur raisers from authority of the game commission was passed in the senate Monday and sent to the house. Breeders of silver fox, mink, chinchilla, caracul and rabbit will be regulated under a new law contained in the bill. They will be under the department of agriculture if the bill is approved in the house.

Hawaiian Students to Receive College Aid

The house Monday moved to include Hawaiian students in its measure which exempts Alaskan students from paying out-state tuition at Oregon colleges. On motion of Rep. Max Landon, it sent back to committee its already-approved bill for Alaskans, with instructions that Hawaiians be included. There was no opposition.

Peck Lauds Anderson For Benefit Measure

Rep. Grace O. Peck of Portland presented a plant Monday to Rep. Gust Anderson, also of Portland, and spoke from the floor in general commendation of the labor official for his work in winning passage of a bill providing additional benefits to permanently disabled workmen.

Solons Vote Against 5-Man Road Board

The senate roads and highways committee voted 7 to 2 against passage of a bill to boost membership in the state highway commission from three to five members.

Sen. Ben Musa, The Dalles, said the five-man commission would result in a fairer distribution of highway funds.

Sen. Paul Patterson, Hillsboro, chairman of the committee, said he had been advised that a three-man commission is superior because a larger commission would result in "bickering and conflict."

The highway committee also voted against measures to require permits for moving tractors across highways by farmers owning land on both sides of a road; exempting school buses paying gasoline taxes, and prohibiting autos from driving with only parking lights turned on.

Lobster Valley Switch To Benton County Sought in Senate Bills

Legislation to transfer small sections of Lane and Lincoln counties into Benton county was introduced Monday by Sen. Russell Gardner, Newport.

Two bills would place the Lobster valley, southwest of Alsea, within Benton county.

Gardner said the transfer would improve educational facilities for Lobster valley students. At present the students must travel 65 miles to Waldport high school.

Georgian Likes Parity Boost

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28 — (AP) Rep. Pace (D-Ga.), leading a house study of the whole farm program, has urged a revision of the parity formula which might mean a 25 per cent boost in the farm price support level.

The Georgian said he wants the cost of farm labor, including the work of the farm family, computed in the parity formula.

On the basis of January price levels this would mean a boost in the parity level of wheat, from \$2.19 a bushel to \$2.74.
