Stocks Stage Sharpest Rise In 7 Weeks

NEW YORK, Feb. 28 (AP) — With a last minute buying surge the stock market today moved ahead in its sharpest advance in more than seven weeks.

Gains were from fractions to more than a point with the increases spread generously through most of the major groups in the list.

The forward movement got underway with the opening of the market, slowed down and retraced some of the rise at mid-day, and then started up again toward the close.

The total volume was 740,000 shares with 230,000 shares traded in the last hour.

Rail and steel shares were the leaders of the initial rise, and they held considerable buying interest most of the day. The oil group after lagging behind came through with a rush near the close with substantial gains. Rubber issues and a number of miscellaneous industrials also added good gains in the closing phases of the market.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks rose .6 of a point to 62.4. The industrial component of the average was up 1.6, rails advanced .5 of a point, and the utilities were up .1 of a point.

The day's rise was the best since Jan. 6, and today's average stands slightly under a week ago.

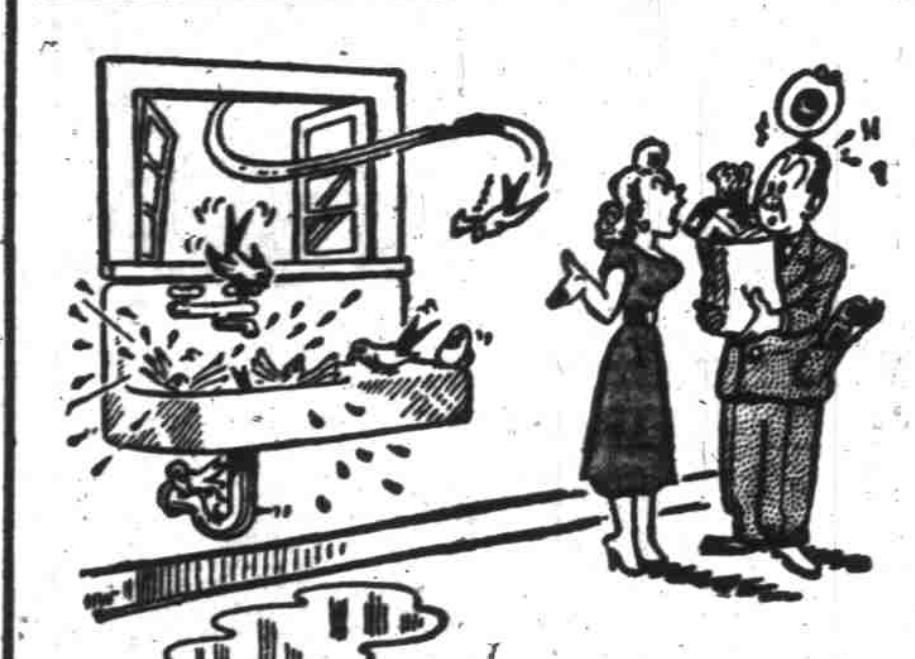
