**County Health Bureau Study Authorized**

Plans for an evaluation study of Marion county health department and the needs of the area served were authorized Thursday by the health executive committee. The state board of health will be asked for assistance.

Officials said that one such evaluation had resulted in the department's obtaining Kellogg foundation funds for training of public health nursing. The five-year program is now under way.

It was noted that the department is experiencing difficulty in recruiting sufficient personnel due to a lack of trained persons. Only two of the five nursing positions in the Kellogg program have been filled.

Principal item in a budget discussion was notice that the department's rental for space in Masonic temple will increase from \$190 to \$250 per month effective July 1.

The health report for January showed 144 births within the county, compared to 170 for January, 1948, and divided equally between boys and girls. Deaths decreased even further, with 24 male and 18 female, compared to a total of 80 for the same period a year ago.

Communicable diseases caused no deaths, although three had been caused by the end of the first month of 1948. Death causes included: heart disease 19, cancer 8, apoplexy and disease of the arteries 3 each.

Leading the list of communicable diseases reported during January was chickenpox, with 108 cases, compared to 15 for the same month of 1948. Measles totaled 34, compared to none; mumps 39 compared to 25; virus pneumonia 13 compared to none; tuberculosis 11 compared to none.

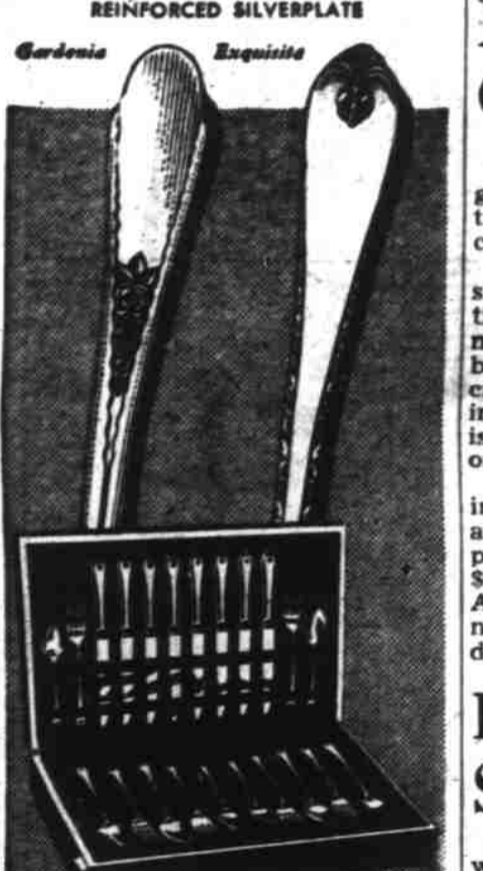
**SILVERTON — Mrs. Orlo**

**Man Held for Grand Jury**

One case was bound over to the grand jury and another set for trial Thursday in Marion county circuit court.

Joseph Hoffman, 1130 Madison st., waived preliminary examination on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses and was bound over. He was arrested by city police on a complaint charging issuance of bad checks. He is held in the county jail in lieu of \$1,000 bail.

Arthur Lewis, Stayton, pleaded innocent to a charge of assault and battery, brought by a private prosecutor, and was released on \$100 bail. His trial was set for April 27. He was arrested Wednesday by a deputy sheriff on a district court warrant.

**Lockwood to Serve Term**

Norman C. Lockwood, Portland, was ordered sent to the state penitentiary Thursday to serve an 18-months sentence, which was suspended last September when he pleaded guilty to stealing cigarettes here.

The suspension was revoked by Circuit Judge E. M. Page, who had issued the sentence. September 17 on a charge of larceny, involving 50 cartons of cigarettes from the local SP&S railroad warehouse.

The Marion county district attorney's office and the state parole board recommended the revocation after Lockwood pleaded guilty February 18 in Portland to a charge of petty larceny and was sentenced to one year in Multnomah county jail.
