

The 3-cent Washington and Lee
University commenorative stamp
will be placed on firt day sale
April 12 at Lexington, Va. This
stamp honors the 200th anniversary of the founding of the university.

The central design is a view of
the university, to the left and right
of which are portraits of Washington and Lee in oval frames. The
stamps will be ble and will be issued in sheets of 50. An initial
printing of 100,000,000 has been
authorized.
