

Symphony at Mt. Angel Friday Memorial to Father Dominic

MT. ANGEL, March 9.—The Father Dominic Memorial symphony concert scheduled for 8:30 Friday night in the hilltop gymnasium is reviving more and more interest in the man whose music inspired Werner Janssen, conductor of the Portland Symphony orchestra, to give the Mt. Angel composer's "Call of the West" to the public.

Two new features are now being planned. A ceremony in the private cemetery, where Father Dominic is buried, is slated for Friday afternoon, during which a wreath will be placed on the composer's grave by conductor Janssen.

Negotiations are under way for a radio broadcast over KOCO of the concert. The prep auditorium is expected to be sold out before the opening.

Stiff Warning To Aggressors In Atlantic Pact

WASHINGTON, March 9.—(AP)—Secretary of State Acheson pictured the still secret Atlantic pact today as carrying a strong warning to any aggressor that the United States would strike back in event of an attack on western Europe.

The treaty is now in its final stages and diplomatic informants here said it possibly will be signed about April 5.

Dispatches from abroad said that British and French officials were checking over the final draft of the treaty, with the British, at least, expected to send word of its approval by the cabinet tomorrow.

Meanwhile, Acheson said definitely today the text of the treaty will be made public.

Police received a phone call from the campus about 9:35 p.m. that a man was prowling the halls of the dormitory sending the occupants into near hysteria.

City Planners Request Council Delay Decision on Traffic Plan

Delay in final city council action on the Baldock traffic plan for Salem was asked Wednesday night by the Salem long range planning commission which will seek another joint meeting with Salem and West Salem city officials and highway department representatives.

The planning commission accepted a divided committee report at a Wednesday night meeting in the chamber of commerce office, but withheld its final consideration of the \$7,000,000 long range traffic plan in which State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock proposes a highway bypass through traffic via one-way streets, including a downtown one-way grid plan, and addition of a two-lane bridge at Marion street.

Salem city council has scheduled a public hearing and its decision on the traffic plan for Monday night at city hall. Baldock has indicated the city must approve one-way streets before the highway department can proceed with the plan.

Protest Bridge Plan
In the long range group's committee report, Commissioners Paul Wallace and Hedda Swart restated their preference for a four-lane, two-way traffic bridge at Division street, as originally recommended by the commission. The Baldock plan would place one-way traffic on the present Center street bridge and on a new Marion street bridge.

Other committee members, Charles A. Sprague, W. W. Chadwick and J. L. Franzen, indicated a willingness to accept Baldock's bridge plan.

The committee, however, agreed in recommending two modifications to the Baldock plan: an expressway along Southern Pacific right-of-way as far south as Mill street and a Highland avenue, through route using a new road along Oregon highway 99E in north Salem with North Commercial and North Liberty streets.

The expressway, members said, would take heavy traffic from North Capitol and North Summer streets and make unnecessary a one-way plan on those primarily residential streets. The four-lane, two-way traffic expressway would not replace the by-pass route which the commission already has endorsed. The plan would add an expressway to the over-all plan, but declared it would serve many parts of Salem, with traffic draining off at major east-west streets and not all funneling into 12th street.

The other proposed revision, calling for a Highland avenue route for highway traffic, would replace Baldock's proposed one-way traffic on parallel Norway and Shipping streets as connecting Hollywood with North Commercial street.

Cain, Pearson In Dispute Over Wallgren Item

WASHINGTON, March 9.—(AP)—Senator Cain (R-Wash.) today asked the senate armed services committee to determine whether columnist Drew Pearson "can with impunity accuse a United States senator of lying."

Cain made the request in a letter demanding that the committee question Pearson under oath as to what the columnist said about a \$50,000 dice game and Mon C. Wallgren.

Chairman Tydings (D-Md) told a reporter: "Personally I have no intention of subpoenaing Drew Pearson. If he wants to testify, he is welcome to do so."

Cain is battling bitterly to keep Wallgren from becoming chairman of the national security resources board chairmanship—a post for which he has been nominated by President Truman.

In a 6 1/2 hour senate speech yesterday and again today in a letter to the committee, Cain said Pearson told him Wallgren won \$50,000 in a dice game with Johnny Meyer, publicity man for Howard Hughes, West Coast aircraft and movie producer. Wallgren in 1942-43 was a member of the senate war investigating committee.

Pearson, who is in Florida, and Wallgren were quick to react to Cain's speech.

Pearson said the senator had not quoted him correctly. And he criticized Cain for repeating the report "without checking it."

Wallgren denied the story, saying "I've never played a dice game with Johnny Meyer for even a nickel." As for Cain's speech attacking him on the senate floor, Wallgren said "just tripe."

Bus Service To Suburbs Rescheduled

Revised schedules on Oregon Motor Stages city bus service to Keizer, Liberty, Swegle and Four Corners will go into effect Monday, according to a state public utilities commission order released Wednesday.

Some of the runs are eliminated on these routes but the areas will be "adequately served during the important morning and night hours," said A. F. Harvey, superintendent of motor transport of the PUC. "No one will be stranded," he said.

New schedules will be available from bus drivers by Friday, bus company officials said.

"Oregon Motor Stages company is operating at a loss in Salem," Harvey said. "These revised runs will back off about 8,500 miles per month from the schedule and will eliminate about \$2,550 per month in operating expense. Even this will not put the company completely in the black."

Harvey produced figures to show that the company operated at a net loss of \$4,494 during January. During that month buses took in \$22,129 in revenue but operating expenses amounted to \$26,624.

Routes effected, said Harvey include Keizer, Liberty—Browning roads, Liberty—Boone roads, Auburn—Fruitland roads and some service to Swegle on Garden road. A mid-evening and overnight service will be established to Four Corners.

Wednesday's order, said Harvey, was granted without a public hearing. If mass complaints develop, however, a hearing will be called, he said. This action is taken, he said, so that Salem could maintain its city bus service at present standards.
