## Seabees to Form Reserve

A campaign to recruit 75,000 skilled construction men as standby reserves for Seabees has been launched by the navy. Recruits enlist in the inactive volunteer reserve for call to active duty only in the event of national emergency.

Recruits will receive full navy credit for the kind and amount of their civilian experience, following the precedent set during the early months of World War II. The new standby force will be in addition to the authorized organized reserve units of Seabees. Standby recruits will not receive pay unless they volunteer for two weeks' annual training duty. About 60 different construction trades are represented in the Seabee organization.

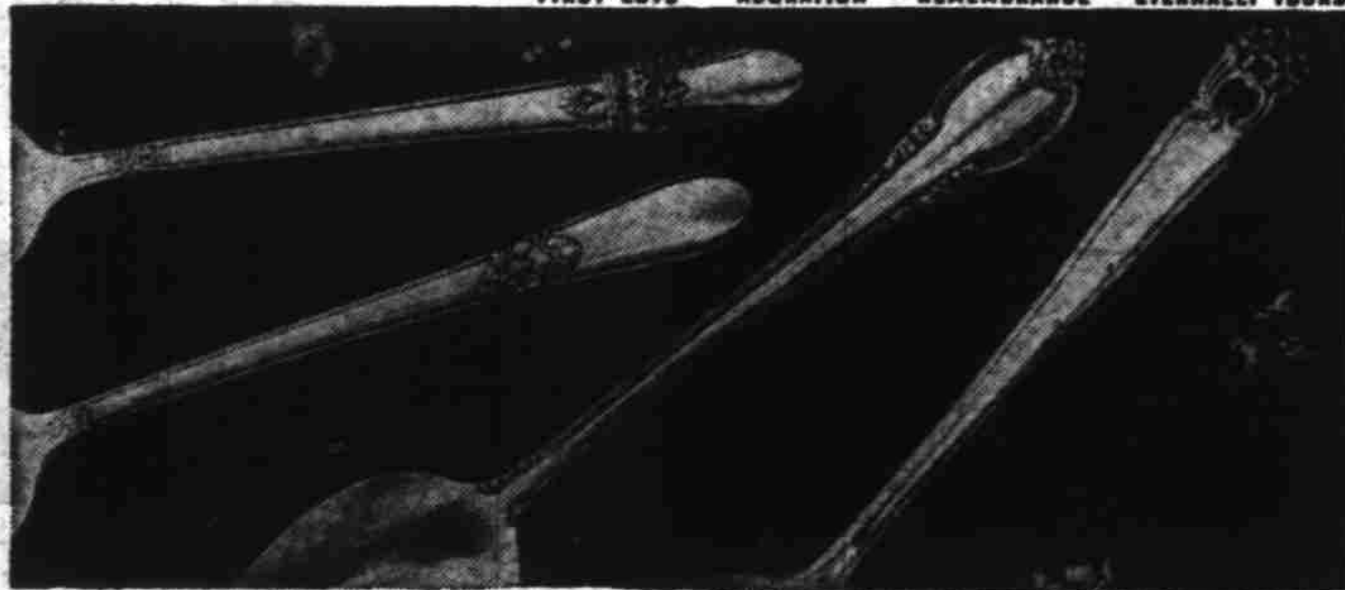
