The Parent-Teacher fellowship will meet at the Salem College and Academy, Monday at 7:45 p. m.

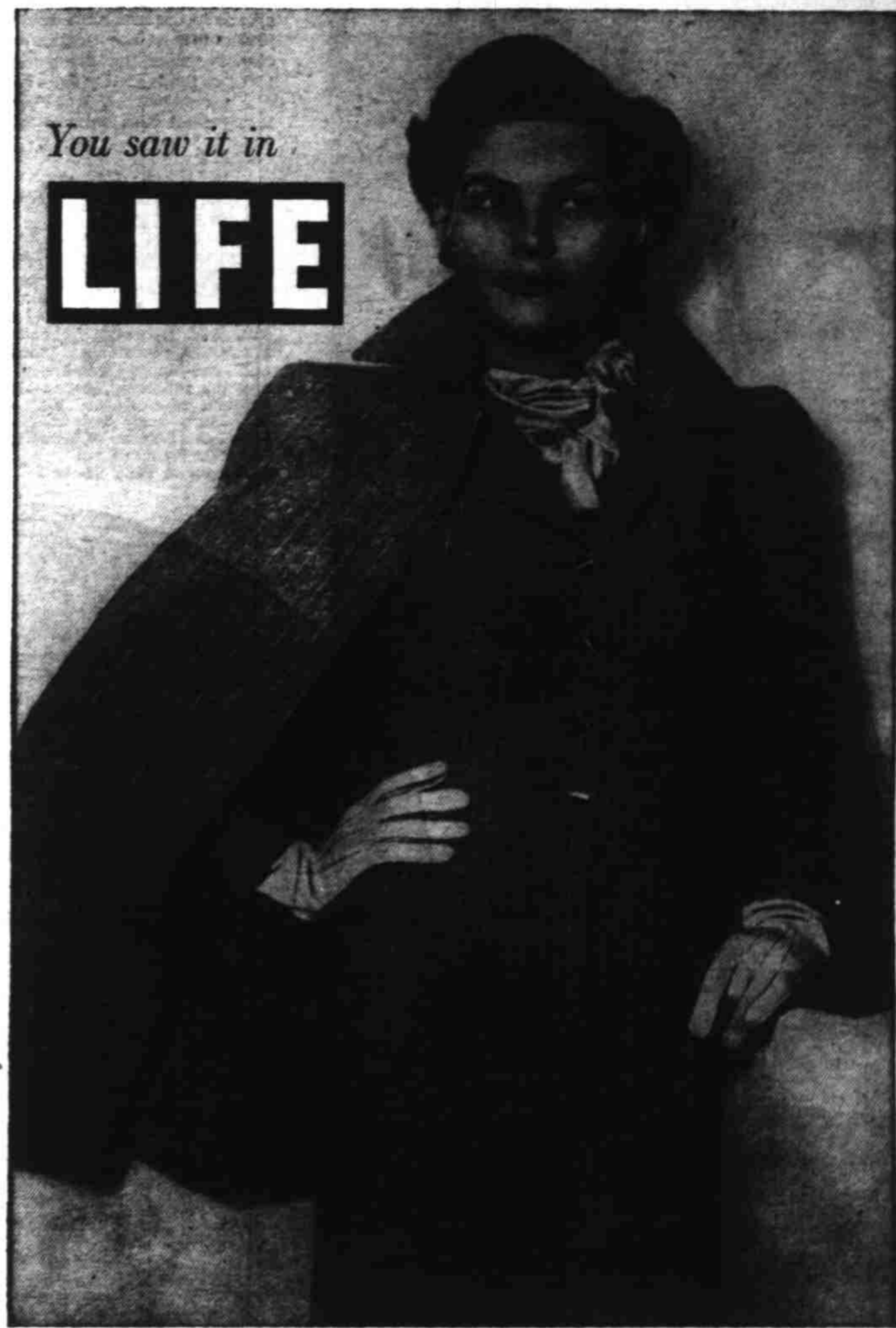
A Kick-Off Dinner
