Good Reading

Cookbook Shelf Yields Many Ideas For Food Stories; Foreign Books too

ROLLING HILLS FARM—You dear readers who have been made to see this little acreage as a place where cows run away at the wrong moment, where chickens go temperamental and roads open up suddenly and hospitably to welcome us, hub deep, as we approach home—you must see our library.

A hypofull of penicillin sending home for a few hours rest allows us time to look over the bookshelf of reference volumes for a cook. Our home library is much more complete than that downtown, and rightfully most of our stories on foods should originate right here from the living room.

For instance we look through the volume Fish and Seafood Cook Book by Cora, Rose and Bob Brown. That's a wonderful reading book. The Browns have a way of chattering about food. It is the time to read a book like this.

Taking the fish alphabetically, the Browns go through a discussion of everything that swims, from anchovy, through eel, haddock, hake and whiting. They even discuss alligator, sea snails and wiggles, whatever they are. But they also write about salmon, smelt and halibut.

The library can lend you this book, and if you like to read about cooking you'll enjoy it.

Good Food from Sweden is another offering from our cook book library. It features the smorgasbord, though the author, Inga Norberg touches, not lightly, on soups, fish, meats and vegetables and gives recipes for hot breads, cakes (we once had a Norwegian friend who raised her hands in horror at the word "cookies," it must be "little cakes") preserves (cranberry pears is an example) and beverages.

Sticking to the foreign, we look over the Chinese cook books. There are several in none of which we find more than a few recipes to our liking. Best, we think, to eat Chinese food at a good restaurant and then go home and devise the dishes for one's self. It's a little like getting an Irish author's recipe for stew or a Hungarian's for goulash. They are all individual.

Our best Chinese Book is by one Henry Low. Cooking at Home in Chinese, where one can find shark fins and parsley soup, snow fungi and ground almonds soup, Chinese roast duck and chop suey. The Picayune Creole Cook Book is one of our favorites for practical use and good reading. One can lose one's self in dreams of the south.

Featured is poultry, but veal is also a favorite. Look at COTELETTES DE VEAU A LA MILANESE

6 veal cutlets
1 egg
1 cup breadcrumbs
1 tablespoon melted butter
Bed of macaroni or spaghetti
Tomato sauce
Have cutlets cut thin, season highly after beating with a rolling
