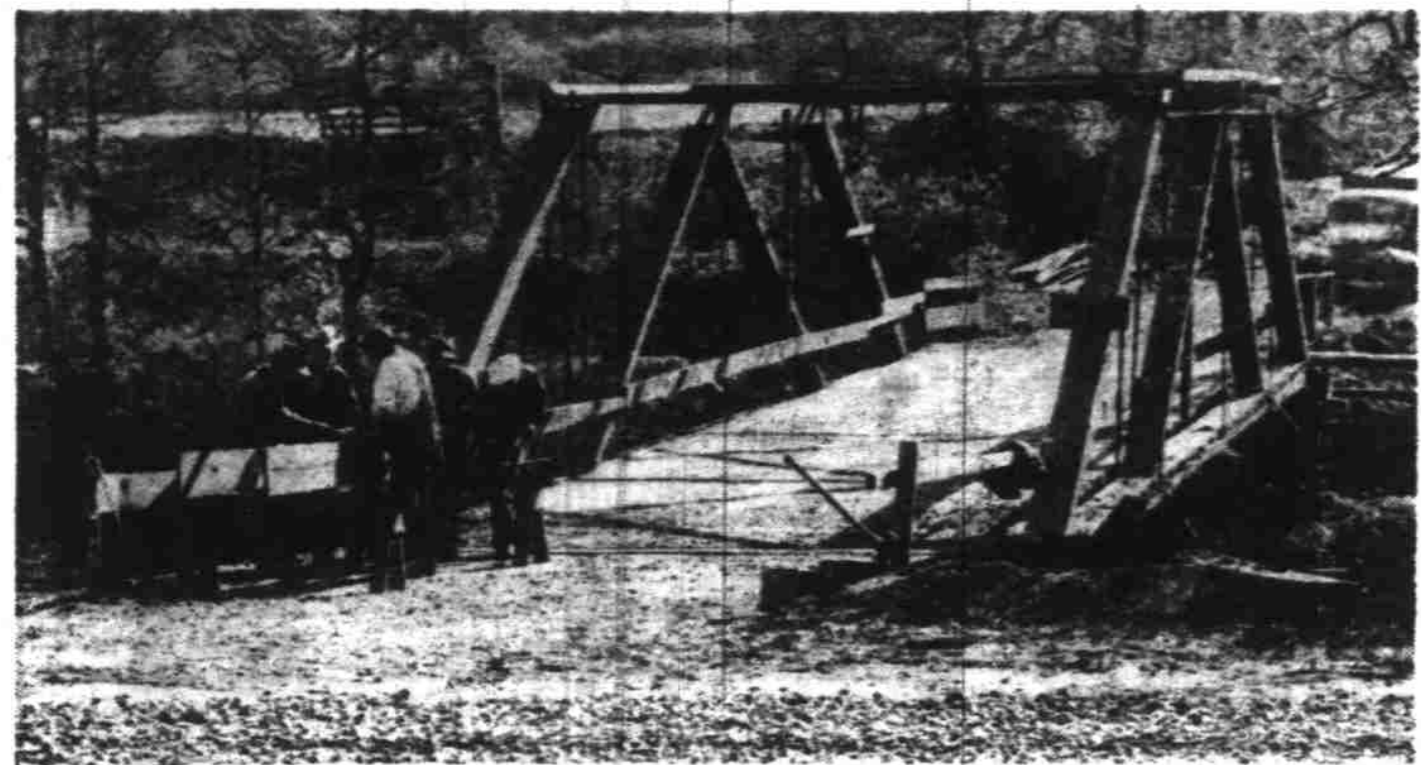
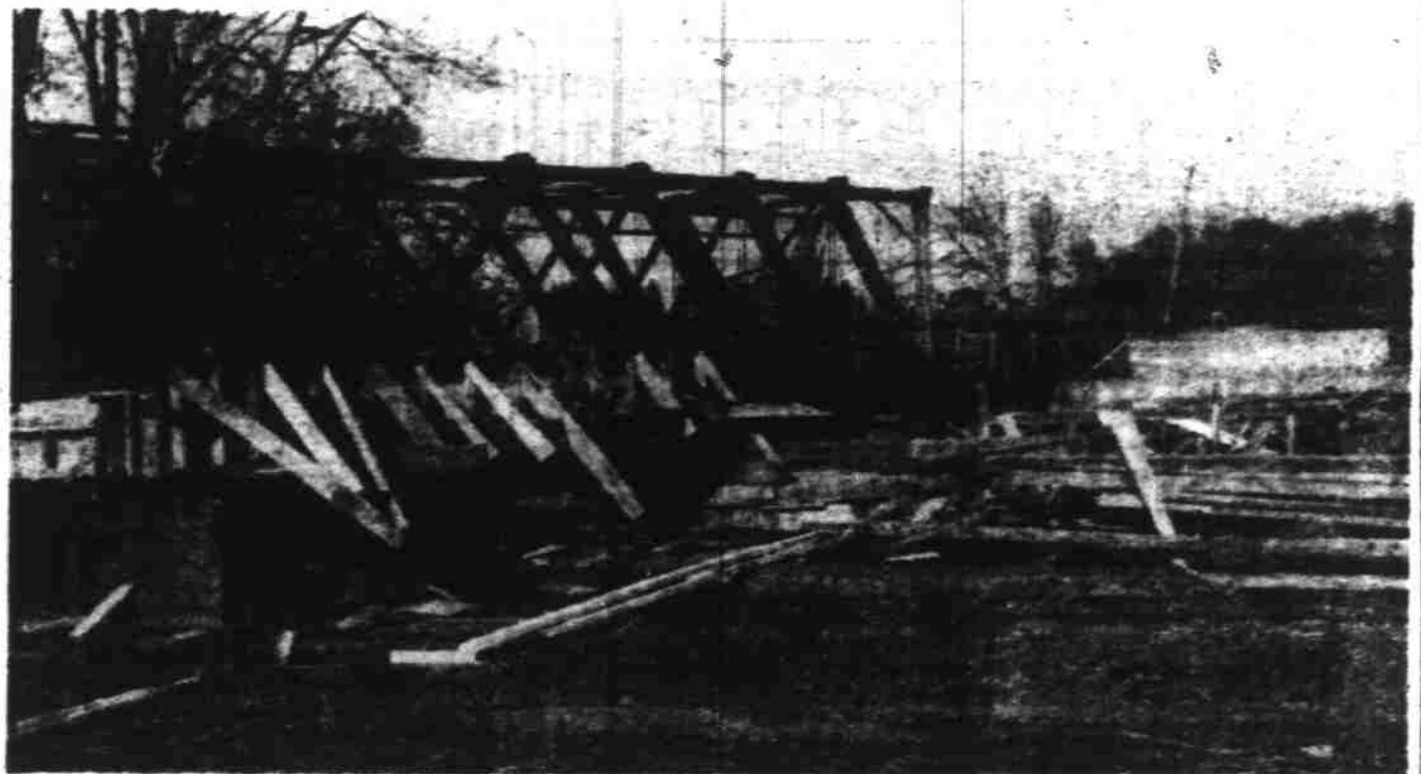


Bridge Program Opens in North End of County



County road crews are at work constructing a new timber bridge to span Abiqua creek in place of the old Dunagan bridge above Silverton. The old covered bridge, 15 feet wide and 60 feet long, is being dismantled as shown above. The new span will be 20 feet wide and 65 feet long. Working in the photo above are Ted Kaenzel, foreman, W. New Bridges Installed in Marion County

Current installation of new bridges in north Marion county marks the beginning of the county's 1949 bridge program, County Commissioner Roy Rice said Saturday.

A new bridge is going in at the Dunagan crossing of Abiqua creek above Silverton. A steel span, formerly owned by the state, is being installed over Pudding river near McKee.

At the Dunagan crossing the old wooden structure is being torn down and a new bridge will be built at the site. It is expected the new span will be completed by about June 1. It will be closed to traffic for the last 30 days of its construction, Rice said.

Rice described the Dunagan project as "an emergency measure" while the McKee replacement, he said, had been on the county's "regular bridge schedule." School districts in that region had complained of the weakness of the Dunagan bridge. It was stated that loaded school buses could not pass over.

The McKee bridge will be completed early this summer. It is to go up alongside the old one which will remain in use.

The county also plans construction of new bridges in the Stayton area and near Wheatland north of Salem.

20-30 Club to Plant Seedlings

Salem 20-30 club will fire the starting shot of a statewide reforestation program this morning when members go to Silver Falls state park to plant 200 Douglas fir seedlings. The clubs plan to plant 50,000 trees in Oregon during 1949, according to Gene Malecki, Salem, state project chairman.

The seedlings are furnished by the state forestry department. With the group of about 15 club members today will be Tom Milne, Klamath Falls, district governor; Nelson Rogers, state forester; and Homer Lyon, jr., state reforestation director.

10 Return to Apartments in Burned House

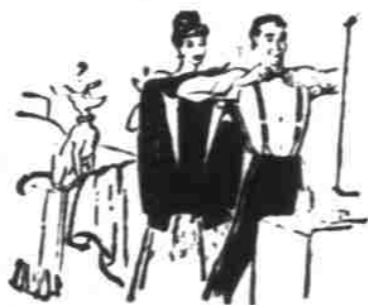
