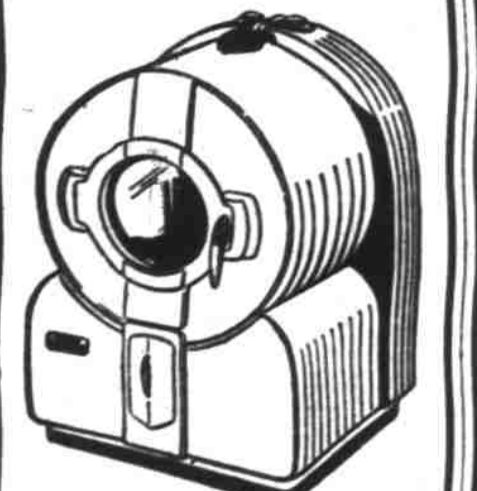

Italian Pastor To Talk Here

The Rev. Anthony Callandro, a native Italian, will speak at a mass meeting Thursday at 8 p. m. at First Evangelical United Brethren church, Marion and Summer streets.

Callandro received his training in American schools and is the founder of the Fellowship of the Reformation movement in Italy. His subject will be "The Possible Reformation in Italy." His coming to the west coast is largely due to the efforts of Dr. Paul Petticoe, Oregon district EUB superintendent, who met Callandro in Italy last summer.

West Coast Governors to Meet Thursday

Governors Arthur B. Langlie of Washington, Earl Warren of California and Douglas McKay of Oregon will attend a meeting in Portland Thursday of the Pacific coast board of intergovernmental relations.

Also attending will be other state, federal, county and city officials of the three states.

Speakers at the meeting, which will last during the one day, include:

Governors Warren and Langlie; Mayor William Devin of Seattle; Washington State Tax Commissioner Thomas Hedges; Colonel Theron D. Weaver, division army engineer at Portland; and Oregon State Unemployment Compensation Commissioner T. Morris Dunne.

Among subjects to be discussed are conservation, unemployment, power, population growth, and income.

Portland Man Denied Writ From Hospital

A writ of habeas corpus and a plea for freedom from the Oregon state hospital were denied a Portland man Tuesday by order of Marion County Circuit Judge E. M. Page.

Judge Page ruled that Verne L. Rathkey, Portland electrician, was "lawfully committed" to the state hospital on order of Multnomah county circuit court in 1941. The order also dismissed the writ.

Rathkey had petitioned the court for his release on the grounds that it never was and is not now dangerous for him to be at large. He also alleged that he is not being detained by any competent tribunal. The petition was heard by Judge Page on March 8.

Judge Page found that Rathkey is "mentally ill to a degree that he is not able to understand the proceedings or assist in his defense" and should not be discharged from the state hospital.

Lease Given To Rock Pit

The state board of control Tuesday approved an application of C. M. Woods, Salem, for a 10-year lease of a rock pit located on a highway running through the state hospital farm here.

Under terms of the lease Woods will take a minimum of 2,000 cubic yards of rock per year for which he will pay the state 10 cents a cubic yard.

Approval also was given a fire loss claim of \$250, involving destruction of a brooder house at the Oregon state penitentiary. The claim will be paid out of the state registration fund which is used in lieu of commercial insurance.

Woman Fined for Breaking Door

Frieda Conover, 243 Chemeketa st., was fined \$25 in municipal court Tuesday following her arrest for disorderly conduct.

Police reports said Mrs. Conover kicked out a plate glass door at the Pastime tavern Monday night during a dispute with a waitress. She was arrested at another establishment later by police who described her actions as "quite boisterous."

Baldock Defends Traffic Proposal at Jaycee Meeting

State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said Tuesday his proposed traffic program for Salem was based on the greatest benefit to the people, was a proven system and was a prudent use of public funds.

He defended the plan for a one-way grid system and for a Marion street bridge over the Willamette river before the Salem Junior Chamber of Commerce at the group's noon luncheon.

"The engineers pointed out that 'this is our town as well as yours' and accepted full responsibility for the proposal. He said it was his duty to base his conclusions on honest facts and not to build them on the 'shifting sands of public opinion'."

Jerry Scott to Leave Scout Office Here

Jerry Scott of Salem, field executive of the Cascade area Boy Scout council for the past two years, has accepted a transfer to the Inland Empire council in eastern Washington. It was announced here Tuesday.

Scott's promotion will take him to Colfax April 15 where he will assume duties similar to those he has here. He will, however, have charge of a larger territory, with council headquarters in Spokane.

"We are sorry to lose Scott," said Scout Executive Gordon Gilmore in announcing the change. "He has done an outstanding job with the scouts in this area." A successor to Scott has not yet been chosen, Gilmore said.
