## More Rhubarb Pie Recipes Given to Housewife For Use During Season

While rhubarb pie has already been discussed in these columns, we have since received recipes for two pastries using rhubarb. The first comes from the test kitchens of a manufacturer of pie

minutes.

1/4 cup sugar

erust mix and is namely simply RHUBARB PIE 3 to 4 tablespoons cold water

4 eups rhubarb, cut into 1/2-inch pieces egg, slightly beaten 1 tablespoon lemon juice

teaspoon grated lemon rind 'tablespoons flour 1/4 teaspoon salt teaspoon nutmeg

1½ cups sugar Combine rhubarb, egg, lemon juice and rind. Blend together flour, salt, nutmeg and sugar. Add dry ingredients to rhubarb mixture. Turn into pastry-lined 9inch pan. Roll out remaining dough and cut into 1/2-inch strips for lattice topping. Place lattice strips over filling; seal ends to bottom crust and flute edge. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) for 10 minutes, then in moderate oven (350°

F.) for 50 minutes. The second is a recipe for rhubarb raisin tarts with crumble topping and could be made into a larger pie instead of individual

RHUBARB RAISIN TARTS WITH CRUMBLE TOPPING 3 tablespoons enriched flour 1/4 teaspoon salt

to ¾ cup sugar 11/2 to 2 cups rhubarb, cut in onehalf inch pieces 1/2 cup raisins

2 teaspoons lemon juice Mix flour, salt and sugar. Sprinkle lemon juice over rhubarb and raisins. Add fruit mix-
