

Council Bans, Limits Parking; Page Quits Civil Service Board

Sweeping changes in parking regulations for North Capitol and nearby streets were voted by the Salem city council Monday night in a meeting which also saw the resignation of Lyle J. Page from the city civil service commission, the sale of a Bancroft bond issue and fresh discussion on North Commercial street extension.

The council prohibited parking on North Capitol from Court to Union streets from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m. except Sundays and holidays; prohibited parking on the west side of 13th street from Chemeketa to Court streets and placed a one-hour parking limit on the east side of 13th street; limited to two hours the parking in vicinity of a medical clinic at Center and 13th streets.

Page's resignation was accepted, with the council indicating it would elect a successor at the April 25 meeting. Page's letter said he did not have sufficient time to devote to the commission. He advised the council that he felt the civil service regulations are inadequate and need complete overhauling. At present the commission is considering changes in age limits for policemen.

Street Bonds Sold

Sale of \$60,313 worth of Bancroft act bonds financing property owners' street improvement assessments was awarded to the low of five bidders, Blyth & Co. of Portland, whose total interest cost figured to \$7,198. Bonds will be bought at par, with interest the first three years at 4 1/2 per cent, the next three at 4 1/4 and the last four years at 2 per cent. First National bank bidding to buy at \$100.17 per \$100 bond value with straight interest at 2 1/4 per cent, had a total interest cost of only \$34 higher.

Appraisal by Salem Board of Realtors placed right-of-way cost at approximately the city's \$15,000 estimate for an extension of North Commercial from Tryon avenue to connect with North River road. The realtors' committee gave a total estimate of \$19,766, not discounting for salvage values expected by the city. Property owners have asked a total of \$29,000.

City Manager J. L. Franzen was instructed to see what can be done about getting the North Commercial extension included in the next city budget.

Zoning Considered

The council rezoned property near Bush school to permit an apartment court and referred to the zoning commission a request by the Church of God for permit to build a one-story frame addition to the church at 940 S. 22nd st. for Sunday school and living quarters.

A package beer license was approved for Oakridge market and trailer park, 1155 S. 14th st., over the objection of Police Chief Clyde Warren. The council rejected a request by C. G. Lawrence for using a 28-foot strip of curbing for loading area at a 422 S. High st. store. Referred to City Attorney Chris J. Kowitz was a claim for \$310.50 for car damages, loss of work and towing fee by Moises Aguilar who blamed a defective South 14th st. bridge for a car accident involving him last December.

Death Believed Friday Evening For 3-Year-Old

SAN MARINO, Calif., April 11.—(AP)—The coroner's office, which investigated the death of 3-year-old Kathy Fiscus in a 200-foot well, indicated today that death took place Friday night, while her mother knelt at the mouth of the well, her heart constricted by fear.

"Can you hear me, Kathy?" she shouted.

"Yes," came back a faint voice. "Are you lying down?" asked Mrs. Fiscus.

"Yes," answered Kathy. There followed more screams, and the anguished mother finally made herself heard again.

"Kathy," she asked, "are you standing up?"

Kathy's answer to this was still another "yes."

The frightened little girl had no way of judging her position in the fearful black tomb.

Rescue workers lowered a line 50 feet into the rusty old well casing and shouted instructions to Kathy. They told her to grab the rope; to try to hold on while they pulled. They thought they felt a tug at the other end, and then, gently, they pulled upward. The noose dangled empty as it came out.

Kathy apparently slipped farther down the casing while she was trying to comply with instructions to grab the rope.

A rubber ball was lowered on a string. It stopped at 87 feet. The ball came up dry. Rescuers were buoyed by the belief that at least there was no water at the level where Kathy was lodged.

But early Sunday they encountered a sandy formation in the rescue tunnel and water rushed in to halt the operations for hours.

Kathy was dead in the water. But feverish rescue efforts continued until 8:58 o'clock Sunday night, when a physician announced to the crowd of 15,000 onlookers that the little girl was dead.

Dr. Hanson said that many people want to send flowers to Kathy's funeral. He added the parents' request that equivalent amounts of money be sent to the children's hospital in Los Angeles, "so little Kathy's death might be the cause of saving some child for a useful life."

Police School Set to Begin Here Today

Salem policemen will tuck their books under their arms and go to school today to learn the reading, writing and arithmetic of police work.

Classes for the Salem staff and representatives of departments throughout the area will open in the council chambers of the city hall at 1:30 p. m.

Many cities throughout the upper-Willamette valley plan to send officers to the regional school, conducted by the Oregon Association of City Police Officers, Oregon State Sheriff's association, the FBI and the state division of vocational education.

Lt. Farley A. Mogan, Oregon state police, will be in charge of the school here. Instructor for today's session will be Capt. Eugene Ferguson of the Portland police department. The class will be on statutory crime essentials.

All of Salem's police officers will attend the school with provisions for some of the day shifts to go to Corvallis for the classes.

Services Set For Lyons Boy Dead in Crash

STAYTON, April 11.—Funeral services will be held Wednesday at 2 p. m. in the Weddle chapel here for James Eccleston, 18, Lyons route 1, who was killed Sunday afternoon when he was thrown from his motorcycle on a turn near Mill City.

Eccleston had just passed a car on the highway and it is believed his cycle failed to negotiate the turn about a mile west of Mill City. The accident occurred shortly before 2 p. m.

Born near Stayton, July 27, 1930, Eccleston had spent nearly all his life in the area. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Eccleston, Lyons. Also surviving is a sister, Eileen Eccleston, Lyons.

The Rev. T. Courtney will officiate at funeral services with burial in Weisner cemetery here.

Dies 2 Days After Wedding

POULAN, Ga., April 11.—(AP)—Gov. Chase S. Osborn of Michigan, who adopted a daughter at the age of 71, then dissolved the adoption and married her at 89, died today—two days after the marriage.

Death was attributed to the after-effects of pneumonia, the last of a siege of disabilities that had plagued the rugged old man for the last five years of his life.

By his side was the brilliant 55-year-old woman, who for nearly a quarter of a century had been his faithful aide and secretary—his adopted daughter and then his wife.

'Occupational Fatigue' Sends Forrestal to Rest in Hospital

WASHINGTON, April 11.—(AP)—Navy physicians said today James V. Forrestal, recently retired secretary of defense, is suffering from "occupational fatigue" which is "directly the result of excessive work during the war and postwar years."

They said he needs rest, and that he is progressing satisfactorily at the Naval Medical center at Bethesda, Md.

Forrestal, who is 57, has been a patient at Bethesda for 10 days. He was flown there from Florida, where he had gone after turning over his cabinet position to Louis Johnson.

Rear Adm. N. L. Pugh, deputy chief of the navy bureau of medicine and surgery, told reporters that fatigue such as Forrestal is suffering from affects the victims both physically and mentally.

Pugh said, however, that he has talked with Forrestal and the former defense chief "talked very rationally."

Capt. B. W. Hogan, acting medical officer in command of Bethesda, issued a bulletin which said Forrestal in recent weeks lost 25 pounds. "At the present time he has a marked low blood pressure, a secondary anemia, and a neuromuscular weakness which is characteristically seen in states of exhaustion."

Former associates, meanwhile, told reporters they can recall only one three-day Christmas vacation Forrestal took since he first became secretary of the navy in May, 1944.

Cancer Curing Chances Said On Increase

Cancer is on the increase as a killing disease, but research and public education on an organized basis will do much to reduce the toll, Salem Chamber of Commerce was told Monday at a luncheon by Dr. Frank B. Queen, Oregon cancer control expert.

Since the curability of cancer declines with every delay in obtaining medical treatment, Dr. Queen declared, one of the big tasks is to urge the public to recognize cancer's danger signals and seek medical advice.

He said nationwide statistics show 25 per cent of cancer cases are now cured, as compared with only 15 per cent cured 10 years ago. Another 25 per cent could be cured if treatment were started earlier, but the remaining 50 per cent of cases require the advances of modern research for hope of cure, Queen declared.
