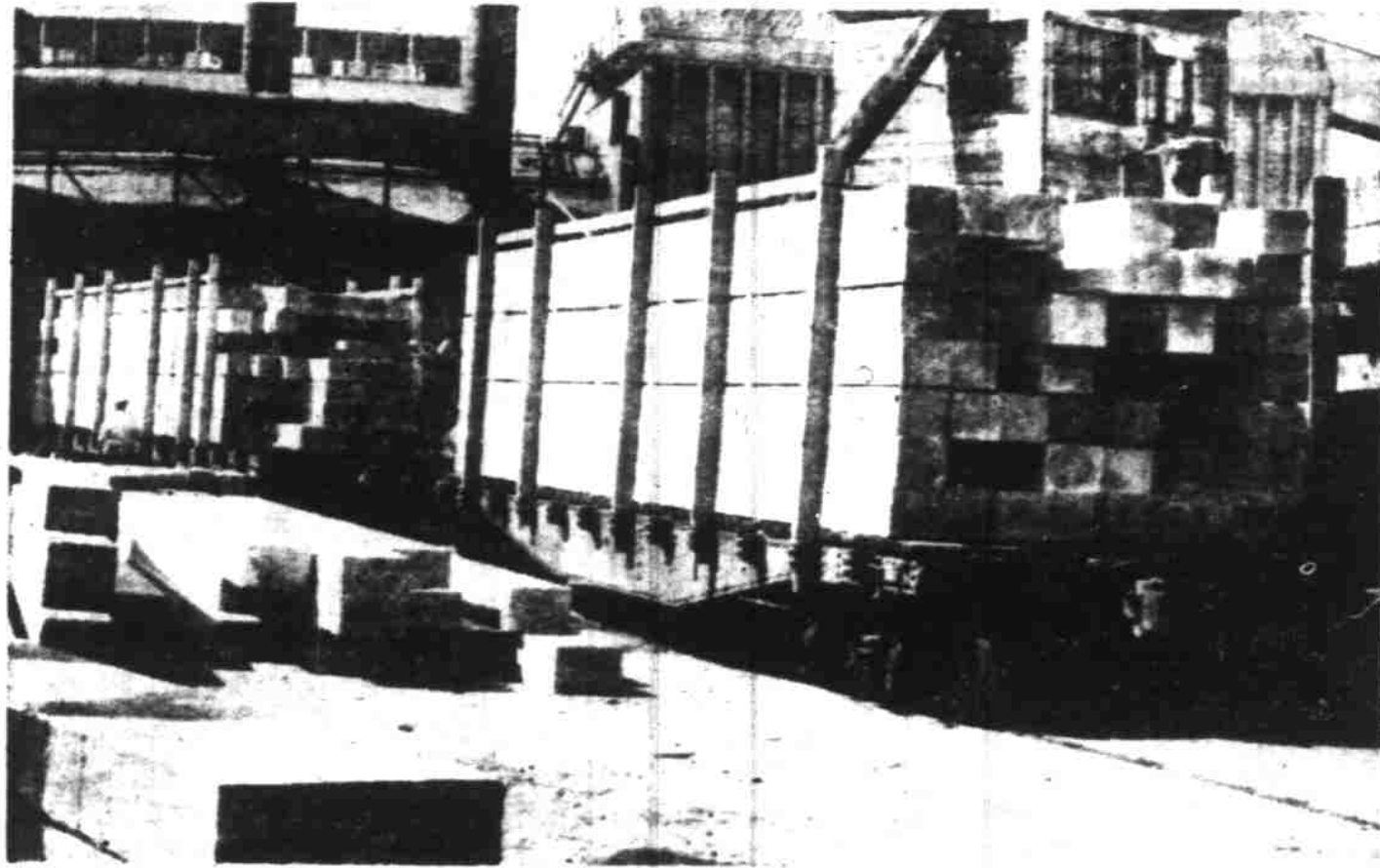


Heavy Lumber Goes to Detroit Dam Site

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—Dr. P. B. Magnuson, chief medical director of the Veterans administration, as testified he would like to see 18 veterans hospitals moved from "isolated locations."

This was revealed Monday when the house appropriations committee made public testimony taken early this year on appropriations for the VA.

A Veterans administration spokesman told a reporter no formal program for making the transfers was underway or proposed.

Dr. Magnuson had commented "the only reason I want to change them is because they are isolated stations." Asked to name the location to which he would want to move the existing hospitals, in which the director said "the veterans are not getting the kind of service we want to give them," Dr. Magnuson listed:
