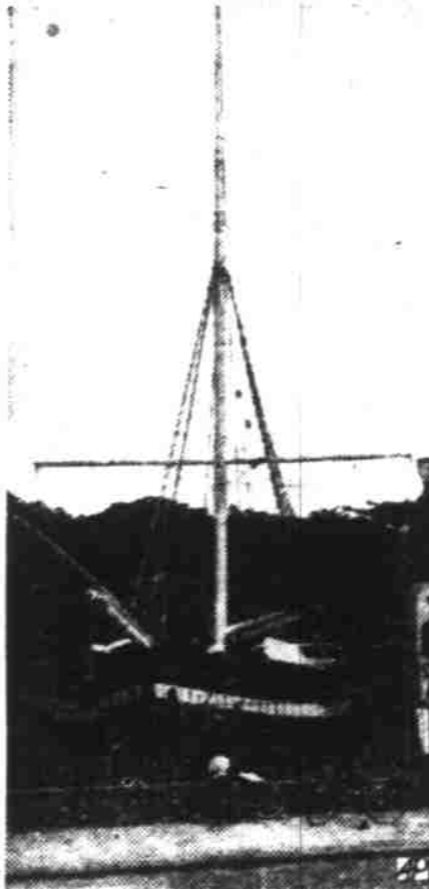

State Boosts Vet Educational Aid

A \$15 increase in state educational benefits to Oregon World War II veterans attending full-time courses in college and undergraduate study will go into effect September 1 by virtue of an amendment approved by the current legislature and signed by the governor, the state veterans department announced Wednesday.

W. F. Gaarenstroom, department director, explained that the increase from \$35 to \$50 in monthly benefits should prove helpful to college veterans whose federal benefits are expiring. The \$35 state aid will remain in force for all but those taking fulltime undergraduate college studies.

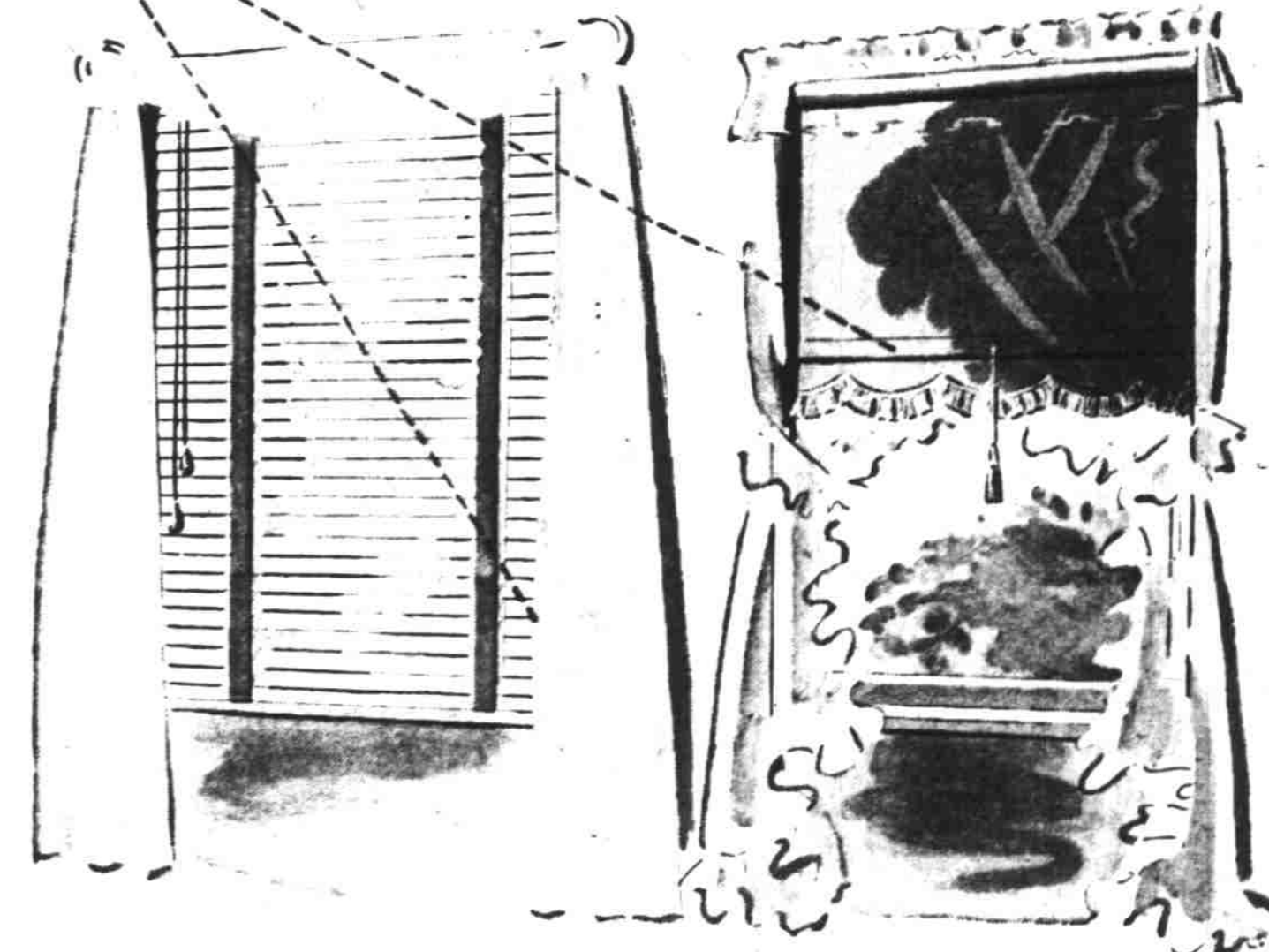
