

Tally Indicates Approval of School Budget

Unofficial reports Tuesday showed both the annual Marion county rural school district budget and a consolidation measure gaining approval although only 18 of the county's 83 districts had reported.

The measures were voted on Monday night in all districts with the exception of the county's first class districts. Up for approval was a \$1,218,365 budget for 1949-50 and a proposal to merge union high school district 43 of Stayton with the Marion county rural school district.

Partial returns showed the budget being favored 836 to 453 and the merger approved 607 to 332. Stayton union high school district voters approved the consolidation measure 155 to 9. They did not vote on the budget.

Complete returns from some of the key districts showed that Keizer favored the budget 303 to 22. Other districts' votes included Union Hill, 6 yes and 168 no; St. Paul, 25 yes and 4 no; Stayton, 120 yes and 7 no; Turner, 27 yes and 5 no; Haystack, 8 yes and 15 no; North Salem, 55 yes and 1 no; Salem Heights, 128 yes and 26 no; and Pratum, none yes and 49 no.

On the consolidation measure these districts were included among those bringing in complete returns: Union Hill, 3 yes and 166 no; Stayton, 125 yes and 3 no; Keizer, 307 yes and 43 no; Mt. Angel, 17 yes and 64 no; Haystack, 12 yes and 10 no; North Salem, 12 yes and 4 no; Salem Heights, 116 yes and 4 no; Turner, 4 yes and 27 no; St. Paul, 4 yes and 25 no; and Pratum, none yes and 49 no.

Completed returns must be in to the office of Mrs. Agnes Booth, Marion county superintendent of schools, within five days from the date of election, she said Tuesday.

Kingwood Area Zoning Study Planned Soon

Zoning of the Polk county area recently annexed to Salem will be studied this month by a committee of the city planning and zoning commission, with a public hearing on suggested zoning to be called within a month.

Robert Stanley, Robert Forkner and City Manager J. L. Franzen will report their zoning study to the commission for discussion and tentative zone plan before the hearing. Zoning of the 368-acre area has been held up by an injunction suit opposing the annexation. The suit was dismissed last week in Polk county circuit court.

The zoning study was authorized as a regular commission meeting Tuesday night in city hall, when several requested zone changes and variance permits also were considered.

The commission approved and recommended to the council a class III-X zone for a subdivision which Portland General Electric seeks to build along the Oregon Electric tracks near Jefferson and 4th streets.

A remonstrance petition against the zone change, representing 51.8 per cent of affected property in the area, was rejected because it did not meet the legal requirement of showing cause why some signers withdrew their original consent since PGE obtained a 59.5 per cent signing to petition for the change from present residential zone.

Public hearings were called for May 17 on a business zone at Rural and 13th streets for W. R. Ransom & Son, and on permits for creating second story apartments for Maude May Gobert at 695 N. 18th st. and Mrs. Elizabeth Young at 1596 N. 4th st.

The commission endorsed to the city council permits for additions to Church of God, 940 S. 22nd st., and Court Street Christian church at 17th and Court streets.

Debate Over Treasurer Job Still Inactive

PORTLAND, April 19—(AP)—Wrangling over Multnomah county's treasurer job continues with lots of words and no definite action. The office was shut down for the second day.

Democrat Ray Dooley remains in a Vancouver, Wash., hotel and still demands he be given the opportunity of a public hearing or trial in the dispute with the republican-dominated county commission. Dooley moved across the Columbia over the week end after commission chairman Frank L. Shull declared the treasurer's office was vacated by failure to post a new \$100,000 bond as required by law.

Meanwhile, almost everyone concerned at the court house had a word or so on the topic today.

Clarence Porter, agent for the bonding company that cancelled Dooley's original security, said the office situation "is bad all the way through." He didn't elaborate publicly.

Ivan W. Elder, budget office worker named yesterday by Shull as a possible temporary appointee, said today he didn't want the post. He explained his civil service status might be impaired. Then later today it became apparent that Shull himself might take the job. Shull noted the office pays less than he may get after July 1, but has fewer worries.

Should Shull be given the post, it would mean two new faces in the county commission. Alan Brown's resignation has been on Shull's desk for several weeks. Democrat M. James Gleason would be the only man staying put.

Navy Men in Salem to Ready Air Facilities

Fourteen enlisted navy men have arrived in Salem and are awaiting orders to begin repair work on the new Salem naval air facility at McNary field, it was reported Tuesday.

The men are billeted at the Salem naval reserve armory on Turner road. They expect to receive orders this week to begin work on the hangar at the east side of the Salem airport. In the meantime they are working at the armory.

The men include: YN1 James E. Brown, YN3 John F. Toevs, HM1 Robert E. Dant, AD1 Charles P. Holman, HD1 William C. Kneider, AD1 Philip R. Yoder, AD2 Philip E. Gille, AM2 Kenneth J. Taylor, AF2 James B. Westfall, AL1 Howard E. Roberts, YNSN Donald B. Baal, SN Thomas W. Giles, YNSN Robert G. Glasspool and AN2 Glen H. Haworth.

All except Dant and Brown are from the Salem area. They will make up the regular navy crew of the air reserve squadron when it arrives. Their commanding officer, Lt. Comdr. Wallace Hug, is still in Seattle, Wash., but is expected to return this week.

Boy Robs Canada Bank of \$2,000. Turns Himself In

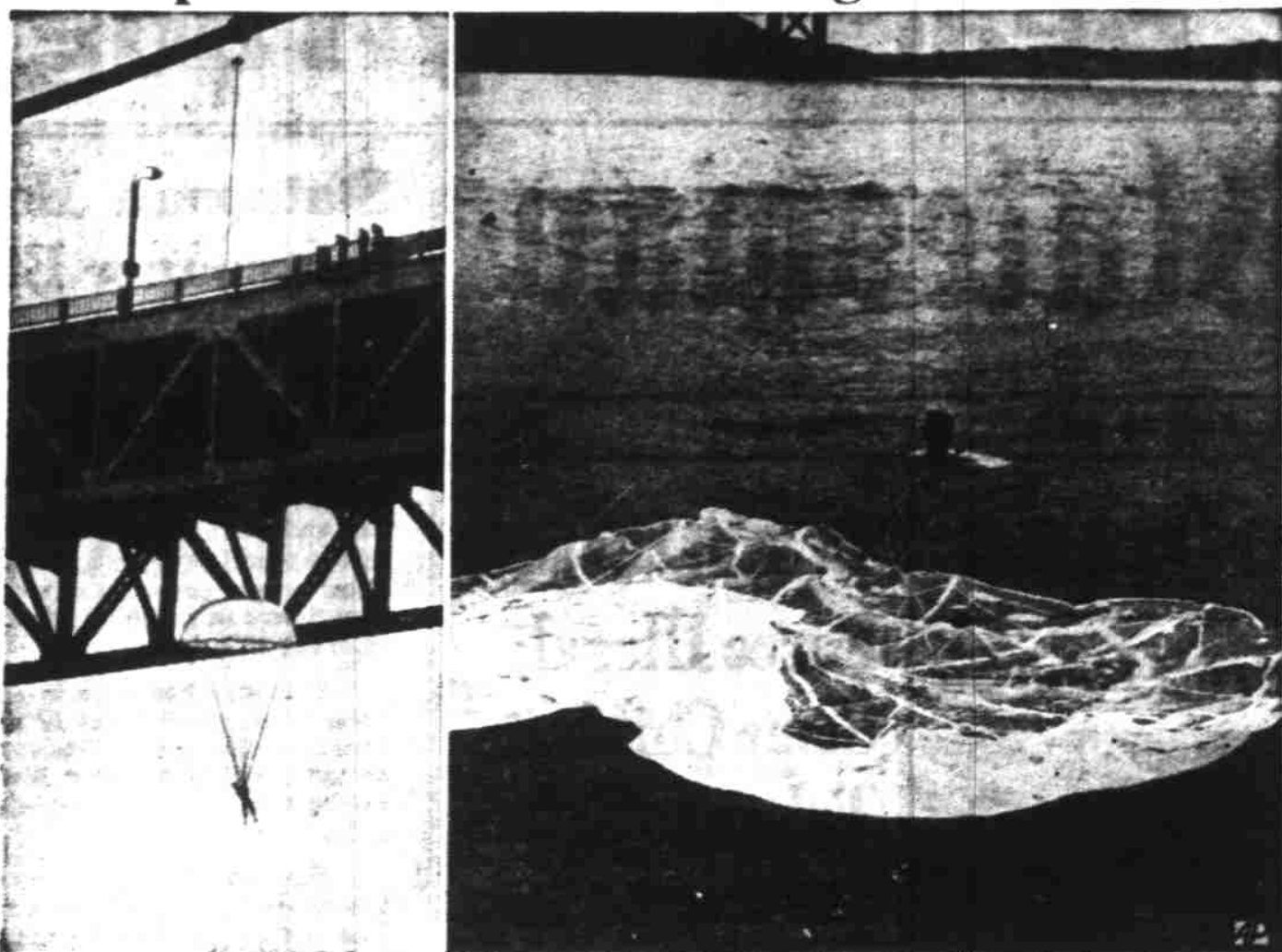
VANCOUVER, April 19—(CP)—A pug-nosed boy who robbed his bank employers at gunpoint today gained only about \$2 for his pains.

Reclamation, Bureau, Army To Coordinate

WASHINGTON, April 19—(AP)—The administration's bill to create a Columbia valley administration in the Pacific northwest was introduced in the senate today by Senator Magnuson (D-Wash.).

Meanwhile the army engineers and the reclamation bureau announced today an agreement which they said should be of aid to the proposed CVA.

Under the agreement, the engineers and bureau will coordinate their activities in developing the river basin. There will be no changes in responsibility for projects under construction but hereafter they will be joint preparation of construction schedules in cooperation with states and other government agencies.

The reclamation bureau under this agreement will have primary responsibility for construction of projects for irrigation and related power. The army engineers will be responsible for projects having to do with navigation, flood control and related power production. Under the plan all power revenue in the northwest would be pooled.

Magnuson told the senate he expected the public works committee will hold exhaustive hearings on his bill both here and in the Pacific northwest. He declared the bill has been carefully tailored to fit the needs of the Columbia basin states which he said would be given a voice in operation of the proposed agency.

He told the senate the day may come when power from the Columbia valley, not needed in the region, may be sent into Wisconsin. He made the assertion in reply to a question by Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Magnuson said 17 senators had joined him in sponsoring the bill.

Contracts for 53 Tons of Clackamas Hops Filed

OREGON CITY, April 19—(AP)—Contracts for sale of more than 53 tons of 1949 crop Clackamas county hops were on file here today calling for prices of 47 to 50 cents a pound.

Five growers were involved in the deal with S. S. Steiner, Inc., a New York broker. The 47-cent price was for fuggles hops and the 50 cents for late cluster hops.

Cannery Work to Start Monday at Woodburn Plant

The 1949 cannery season will open in this area at the General Foods plant in Woodburn where processing of rhubarb is slated to begin next Monday.

Processing of the same product is scheduled by Blue Lake packers in West Salem about May 5. The crop is reported to be good and will hit the canneries at about the same time as last year.

Processing of spinach and peas is expected to start at a number of plants in the Salem area about mid-May. Strawberries are anticipated about the last of May and about one week earlier than last year.

Parental Dispute Creates Near-Riot In Albany Court

ALBANY, April 19—(AP)—Sheriff H. A. Southard and a deputy had to break up a near-riot in circuit court today in a parental dispute involving custody of a child.

The officers pulled screaming, punching, hair-pulling women spectators from William B. Cox, Lebanon, and restored order. The mother of five-year-old William Cox had fainted during the melee. Court aides reported Cox had picked up the baby and started walking from the court. This follower Judge Victor Olivieri's ruling that he did not have jurisdiction.

The parents were divorced in Lane county and Cox given custody of the boy. Later the father agreed to allow his former wife, Victoria Shell, Brownsville, and her new husband to adopt the boy. He since had changed his mind.

The boy left court today with the mother.

Phenuron Drug Aids Epileptics

DETROIT, April 19—(AP)—A new drug, phenuron, helps some epileptics not benefited by other drugs, Dr. Guy M. Everett of Chicago said today.

It's been found effective in some resistant cases of three types of epilepsy, he told the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology.

These are grand mal and petit mal seizures, the big and little attacks of epilepsy, and psychomotor attacks. In the last kind, the persons will do things and be unable to remember them. Phenuron is particularly useful in psychomotor attacks, he said.

Many of the drugs used to control epilepsy have a sedative effect. But this one more often seems to cause signs of stimulation, said Dr. Everett, pharmacologist of the Abbott research laboratory. It is also low in toxicity or undesired side effects, he added.

Roble Reveals Study of Salem Fire Potential

Advance study of plans to fight potential fires in Salem buildings which are considered hazardous has been adopted by the Salem fire department, Chief W. P. Roble announced.

The plan, suggested by Capt. Paul L. Phillips, calls for study of how to make best use of fire fighting equipment to prevent spread of a blaze. General application of the plan has been worked out for possible emergencies arising from the hazard created by the old Paulus cannery at Mill and South High streets.

The cannery, long a hazard because transients use it for shelter, would threaten the Portland General Electric sub station which is on the west should a major blaze break out there.

Detailed plans for meeting emergencies in other hazardous areas are also being worked out by the fire department. The area from Mission street to Market and 12th street to the river is included in plans for similar studies.

Swedish Star Nabs Marathon

BOSTON, April 19—(AP)—Long and smooth striding Karl Gosta Leander, the 31-year-old Swedish champion, ran a front race for the last 15 miles today to win the Boston AA's 53rd Hopkinton-Boston marathon in two hours, 31 minutes, 50.8 seconds.

He finished about a half mile ahead of the closest of his 14 rivals, Vic Dyrigall, a New York accountant making his first start over the 26 miles, 385 yards grind. Dyrigall, who started his track career at the University of Idaho under Coach Mike Ryan, winner of this endurance race in 1912, was clocked in 2:34:42.

Folsom Asks Federal Aid For All Aged

WASHINGTON, April 19—(AP)—A government check every month for everyone over 65 was proposed today by Alabama's Governor James E. Folsom.

He called it the "Jim Folsom Plan," in testimony before the house ways and means committee. The committee, which is studying President Truman's recommendations for expanding the social security system to take in more workers, heard from two Folsoms today. The other was Marion B. Folsom of Rochester, N.Y., treasurer of the Eastman Kodak Co. The men are not related to each other.

Although both Folsoms recommended that old-age insurance coverage be extended to farmers, professional people, and small businessmen, Marion B. Folsom disagreed with some particulars of President Truman's program. For one thing, he doesn't want the social security taxes increased as much.

Governor Folsom sparred with committee chairman Doughton (D-NC) on details of the present law, and after the flurry conceded he had lost the round.

When it was over, the youthful governor concluded with a shout: "I would suggest a general tax to support everybody. I'm just interested in seeing that everybody gets a monthly check from the government when they get to be 65."

"I call it the Jim Folsom Plan."

YW Accepts Program for 'Study Only'

Salem YWCA will notify the national YW association that a nationally-approved YWCA public affairs program will be accepted locally for study only.

This was the gist of a compromise resolution presented by Mrs. Harold Rosebraugh and accepted by a Salem YW membership meeting Tuesday after debate among members whether they as a group should take stands in political and religious issues.

The compromise amended a resolution which had been offered by Mrs. Arthur Madsen to prohibit the Salem YW from participating in political and religious issues and refuse to be bound by any mandate to stand for any political or religious issue.

Only One Mandate
Helen Flack, a regional executive who was secretary to the national YW convention in San Francisco adopted here yesterday, said the only real mandate to the local association is the purpose of the YWCA: "To build a fellowship of women and girls devoted to the task of realizing in common life those ideals of personal and social living to which we are committed."

We do further resolve that our local association is not to be considered a part of any group applying pressure for specific legislation under this or any other program without further vote of our membership.

mitted by our faith as Christians." The YW's public program is not the "intellectual straight jacket" that one member called it, she said, but a starting point for study in public affairs.

Can Not Divorce Politics
Mrs. Robert G. Givens explained that the local public affairs program already presupposes presentation of both sides of an issue. Mrs. Bruce Spaulding said that politics could not be divorced from everyday life, that Christians must take a stand on vital issues, political or otherwise, and that if the YWCA was to "fold up and be a little local ladies' aid society," its program would neither be broad nor hardly worthwhile.

Mrs. A. A. Schramm, YW president, conducted the meeting. Text of the Salem YW's resolution as finally passed:

RESOLVED: That we, duly qualified elector members of the Salem, Oregon, YWCA, in regular meeting assembled, affirm that we are joined together as a Christian service group; in order that we may render a maximum service to our own community and to the women and girls of America, we believe that as an organization we should generally refrain from participation in political or religious issues, controversial or otherwise.

Be it further resolved: That the Salem, Oregon, YWCA notify the National YW association that a group we do now accept the so-called PUBLIC AFFAIRS PROGRAM adopted at the national convention in San Francisco for study only, and as only a partial study program. We take this position in the sure belief that by so doing we can best operate our organization according to the teachings of Jesus Christ, the purpose of the YWCA, and thus be of greatest service to women and girls.

We do further resolve that our local association is not to be considered a part of any group applying pressure for specific legislation under this or any other program without further vote of our membership.
