\$14,000 Service Station Planned At Mill City

STAYTON—Construction of a modern service station on their property at Mill City is being planned by Mr. and Mrs. Charles S. Morgan of Stayton, who hope to have it completed by June 1. The steel framework of the building is now being built at the Ray F. Becker company in Portland, and the company plans to have it ready to install in 45 days.

Just inside the city limits at the eastern edge of Mill City, the lot has a frontage on Highway 222 of 135 feet and is 130 feet deep. Considerable work has already been done on the lot, leveling and grading it.

The service station will be 28 by 40 feet and will have a two-bay grease rack. Estimated cost of the lot and building will be about \$14,000, Mr. Morgan said. It will be an independent station.
