Sudan Grass Gains Favor for Pasture

Sudan grass along with millets and sorghums is firmly established as a summer pasture plant in Oregon, with an estimated 45,500 acres grown in 1948, says H. A. Schoth and H. H. Rampton, federal agronomist at Oregon State college.

These three related crops are best adapted to the coast region, southern Oregon and the Willamette valley, a few places along the Columbia in eastern Oregon and on the Vale-Owyhee irrigated projects.
