## Hot and Good

### Quick Breads, Muffins Add Style to Every Meal From Breakfast to Supper

Hot breads are usually in vogue. For a filling breakfast, to add glamor to lunch and interest to dinner, so called "quick breads" are the ticket.

Muffins are simple to prepare and attractive to see. Here's a good old standard to have in your file of hot breads:

#### TWIN MOUNTAIN MUFFINS

- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 egg

Sift dry ingredients in bowl, add liquids and melted fat. Stir well to mix, bake in 275 oven 25 min.

#### GRAHAM GEMS

- 1 cup graham flour
- 1 cup white flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 level teaspoons baking powder
- 3 tablespoons fat
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons molasses or brown sugar

Mix dry ingredients, add milk, egg and melted shortening. Bake in greased gem pans about 25 min. A bit more sophisticated is this recipe for:

#### ORANGE BISCUITS

- 2 tablespoons melted butter
- 4 tablespoons sugar
- 1 tablespoon orange juice
- Orange rind grated

Cook until thick, then cool. Make biscuits as usual, using pastry flour and a little extra shortening. Roll out 1/4 inch thick, spread with mixture, cut into 1/2 inch slices, sprinkle with sugar and bake.
