In the event that walnut orchards are interplanted with filberts, the sulfur sprays or dusts should be omitted from the formulas as it is toxic under some conditions to filbert foliage.

Growers following a dust program should make six applications at seven-day intervals to protect against infection. If sprays are used, two additional sprays will be necessary after the April 25 ap-
