Ground Meat Serves Busy Housewife As Aid to Budget, Cooking Time

There's always hamburger. Ground beef, or hamburger if you know your meat man, is a boon

Here are several suggestions: SWEDISH MEAT BALLS

1 pound ground beef 4 cup finely chopped onion teaspoon salt

teaspoon allspice teaspoon ground cloves egg 4 slices dry bread 4 cup flour


