## Red Cross on Home Stretch Of Fund Drive

Lacking only \$2,616 to make their minimum budgetary goal, officials announced Tuesday afternoon that a concentrated drive will be undertaken within the next few days to wind up the 1949 American Red Cross fund campaign in Marion county.

Campaign total was \$40,384 Tuesday, against the minimum budget requirements of \$43,000. The overall objective had been \$52,000, a figure allowing for expansion of some of the Red Cross services.

Charles H. Huggins, chairman of the Marion county Red Cross chapter, in a special plea to the public for support, said:

"The additional cost to maintain this county's share in the new blood program, and the necessary program to assist veterans and their families make it imperative that the chapter have the budget—minimum of \$43,000. The blood program and the home service department are too important to the community to be sacrificed."

Huggins asked that any firms or individuals wishing to increase their donations may contact the Red Cross office, and he especially urged that all persons or firms who may have been overlooked in the solicitation contact the Red Cross and they will receive the supplies and will be accredited with their gifts.

## Democrats to Attend Dinner At Portland

Luis A. Martin-Lally and Mrs. Roy R. Hewitt will head a Marion county delegation to attend the democrats' annual Jefferson-Jackson banquet at Portland Saturday.

Martin-Lally is chairman, and Mrs. Hewitt, vice chairman of the county central committee. They will cast ballots for new state officers at the party's biennial meeting Saturday afternoon.

U. S. Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.), leading spokesman for TVA, will be guest speaker at the evening banquet. About 600 state party leaders are expected to attend the sessions.

## Mrs. Arneson Resigns from ARC Position

Mrs. Louise Arneson, director of nursing services for the Marion county chapter, American Red Cross, since 1942, announced her resignation Tuesday, effective May 15. Mrs. Arneson said she is planning to go into other work.

Mrs. Arneson from 1940 to 1942 was a volunteer worker, teaching home nursing. In October of 1942 she went on the paid staff to direct the nursing services — recruiting and training nurses aides, conducting home nursing classes, recruiting nurses for the armed forces and assisting with the wartime blood bank.

Under Mrs. Arneson's direction, the local nurses aide corps won a citation of merit from the U. S. civilian defense office for having maintained such a large number

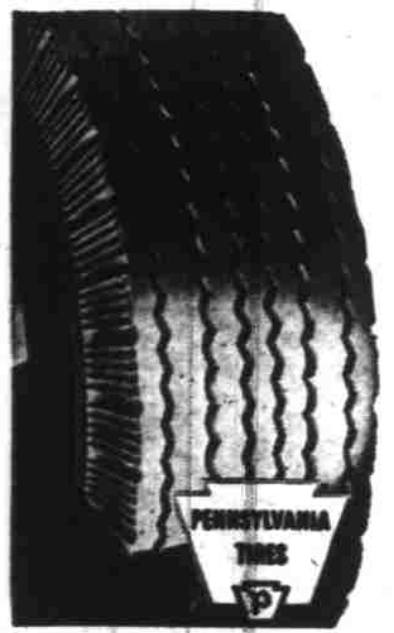
