DAV Sued by Contractor for Building Funds

Charging that less than half has been paid on a \$20,283 bill for labor and materials used in the construction of a building known as "A Memorial Building for Disabled American Veterans," Henry G. Carl Monday filed a complaint in Marion county circuit court seeking a judgment against the Veterans Living Memorial Building association and The Disabled American Veterans, Salem chapter 6.

The complaint states that the former organization was known as Veterans Building association of Marion county Inc. from March until November of 1946.

Carl, a local contractor alleges he furnished materials and supplied labor to the extent of \$20,283 during the period of June 7, 1948 to November 4, 1948 on the building and that only \$10,000 of this sum has been paid. According to the contract, defendants were to pay 25 per cent of the value of labor and materials each month as construction progressed, the complaint continues.

Site of the structure is on the northeast corner of Marion and North Church streets. Funds for it were raised by the building association of the local DAV.

Hearing on State Phone Rates Resumes

Hearing involving the application of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company for an annual rate increase of \$4,123,000, based on its Oregon operations, was resumed Tuesday in Salem before Eugene L. Laird, special examiner

for the public utilities commission. The hearing started last July. E. S. Walling, inventory and costs engineer for the Pacific company, occupied the witness stand most of Tuesday. He was questioned at length regarding studies recently completed by the company in connection with division of revenues between the Pacific company and the American Telephone & Telegraph company. Under the Oregon law amended at the recent legislative session the commission has until June 1 to render a decision in the telephone case. The hearing is being conducted Tuesday in the Salem Chamber of Commerce.
