Hollywood On Parade

HOLLYWOOD — Introductions here frequently are mumbled grunts like "Meet Mr. Gravinwp." So I'm always tickled when anybody gets my odd monicker straight. Jimmy Cagney's kid sister Jeanne did — and remembered it weeks later. I've found her one of the town's most consistently charming people.

Jeanne has big blue eyes, a long blond bob, and a vague resemblance to Jimmy — the lively expressions and quick gestures. Their Irish name, Cagney, means "little fighting cock" in Gaelic, Jeanne says — somehow appropriate when you think of Jim's scrappy characterizations.

He was out on the vaudeville trail soon after Jeanne came

along. The Manhattan family was, Jeanne says, "very poor."

Jeanne wanted to be a doctor, but two older physician brothers talked her out of that. "It's a good thing," Jeanne says, "I'd have died sympathetically with each patient."

She graduated from Hunter college in New York City at 18 — a Phi Beta Kappa. Her language major was to prove helpful in the acting career she hadn't then decided on. A visit to Jimmy in Hollywood followed. It led her to the Pasadena Playhouse, a radio show for Jim and her, and a Paramount contract.

"After four 'B' pictures I said, 'I've got to get stage experience' and asked for my release. I played in Noel Coward comedies in San Francisco for British War Relief and toured the west coast with Mary Boland."

Then came the movie role as Josie Cohan, George M.'s sister in "Yankee Doodle Dandy," starring Jimmy and produced by their brother Bill. "I'm glad Mother lived to see that. It was the first time the three of us worked together."

Summer stock and Broadway shows led to a disappointment that proved a stepping-stone. Until now Jeanne had played sweet ingenues. "Being typed makes you, you," she says, "but it can break you, too." She tried out for a part in the play "A Foolish Notion." The producers decided she

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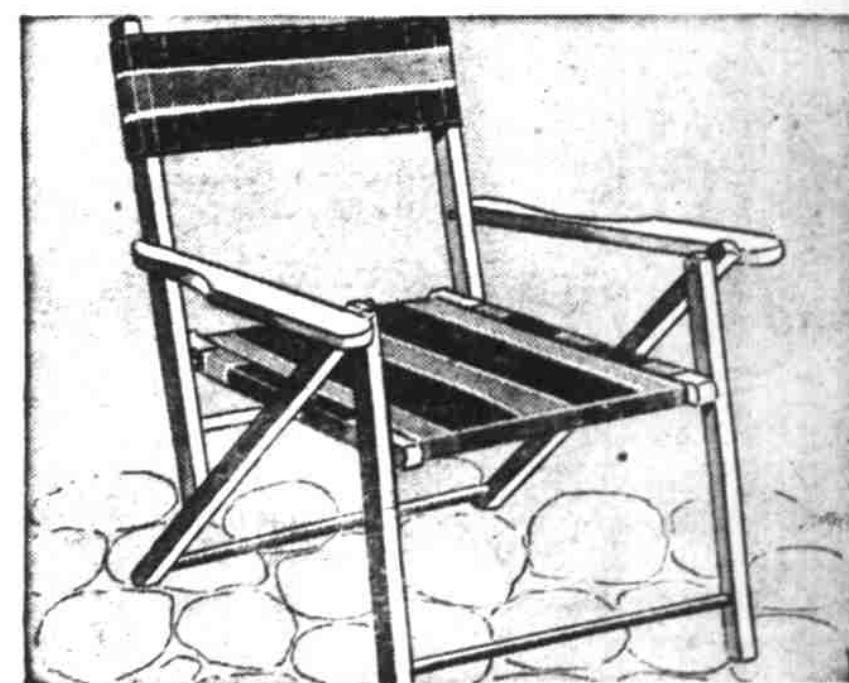
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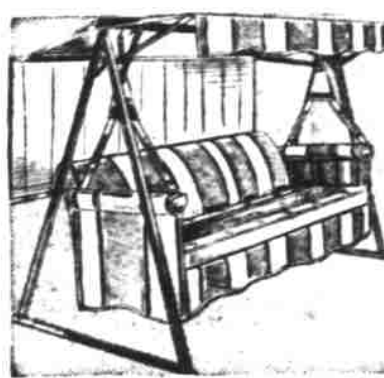
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
