

Home Repairs Credit Eased

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—The government took two new steps today in its broadening drive to halt a business slowdown.

1. It ordered easier credit terms for home repairs and modernization.

2. It boosted export quotas for pork in an effort to bolster a weakening hog market in this country.

These moves followed the federal reserve board's action yesterday to make more money available for loans by its 7,000 member banks across the nation.

The federal housing administration announced that henceforth, you will not have to put up 10 percent of the job costs in cash as in the past when you borrow the money from private lenders under an FHA guarantee.

Inquiry Shows Trusts Remain In Germany

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—American occupation officials have failed to smash a single one of Germany's giant monopolies under a crackdown law now two years old, investigators said today.

A three-man committee, flown to the scene by the army last December, found that only one such case was filed but never completed.

It recorded testimony that high decartelization officials were out of step with presidential policy, fearing it would impede German recovery.

Flatly disagreeing with this view, the committee declared that a democratic economy requires the anti-cartel policy and will prosper under it. The committee contended that the great trusts greatly facilitated Hitler's war career, and that their elimination will help safeguard peace.

PORTLAND, April 29 (AP)—A new name popped up today in the fight for the chairmanship of the democratic state central committee, which will meet here tomorrow to pick its leader.

Two Portlanders—W. L. Joslin and Mike De Cicco—have been campaigning for chairman amid sharp verbal exchanges. Both claim widespread support.

Suggested as a possible compromise candidate was Clarence F. Hyde, Eugene. Hyde responded that while he was not a candidate, "if I am drafted I will serve."

Rerouting of Traffic Due to Court Street

Rerouting of traffic to expedite work on the pedestrian tunnel under Court street in the state capitol district will begin at 7 a. m. Monday, City Engineer J. Harold Davis, has announced.

Southbound traffic on highway 99E will turn west from Capitol into Marion instead of going on to Court. Marion will have through traffic to Commercial street. Northbound traffic will use Court street as usual to Summer street, then will move north to Chemeketa and east to Capitol. No streets will be one-way.

Truck traffic via 12th street will continue the same, except the stop sign at Court and Capitol streets will be moved to Chemeketa and Capitol. Pedestrian traffic will remain open on the south side of Court but will be closed between Summer and Capitol streets on the north side. Davis estimated it would take about 60 days to complete the tunnel work with traffic rerouted, whereas, if one way traffic was maintained it would take twice as long.

Judging will begin at 9 a. m. today on the many exhibits included in the 1949 show. The displays will be open to the public today and tonight and Sunday afternoon.

Dolls, china, horseshoes, lace, white mice, art, flowers, pictures and hundreds of other items are included in the attractive collections on display at the show. Coins, buttons, gems, baskets, boats, stamps, match covers—there are attractions for every interest and every age.

Drawing top interest Friday night was the group display of the Salem Art association with a live ballerina model and several artists at work; and the colorful collections of cut and polished agates from the Salem Gem cutters.

Miniature covered wagon and oxen, Furniture, airplane, spinning wheel and wheelbarrow—all cut from agate—claimed the eye of most spectators.

Among a huge collection of campaign and comic buttons was legitimate proof that supporters of "Honest Abe" wore a picture of their candidate's coat lapels. One stamp collection featured covers from Oregon postoffices of earlier days, towns which no longer exist. Search Flier's Body Found

PORTLAND, April 29 (AP)—A pilot who disappeared while hunting another vanished plane was found dead in the wreckage of his light craft today.

The victim was Bruce Spaulding, 25, Vancouver, Wash., who went out yesterday in the hunt for a missing bomber and failed to return.

A crew of loggers stumbled across the wreckage of Spaulding's plane this morning, north of Forest Grove. The plane had apparently smashed into a hill.

Meanwhile the search continued for the B-26 bomber that disappeared April 21 with three men aboard.
