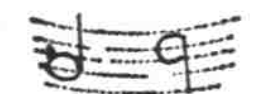

Once Well Known

Icebox Cakes, Popular Dessert in Days When Refrigerators Were Novelty

Much to our surprise, when giving recipes to two prospective young brides, we found that they had never heard of icebox cake. We immediately resolved to give the new generation of housewives the secrets of these desserts.

Icebox cakes are rich desserts put into icebox trays that have been lined with graham crackers or sponge cake and chilled for several hours to mellow.

Here are several examples of this type dessert which attained popularity a few years ago when electric refrigerators were new.

ORANGE ICEBOX CAKE
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup lemon juice
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
Grated rind, 1 orange
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup butter
1 cup orange pulp, finely shredded and drained.

Dissolve sugar in lemon juice, heat in doubleboiler til scalding. Beat yolks, add hot mixture gradually, while stirring. Put back in d.b., cook thick and smooth. Cool. Cream butter and conf. sugar, add orange. Stir in egg mixture, then beaten whites, vanilla and 2 T. conf. sugar (more). Pour into pan lined with graham crackers or sponge cake thinly sliced. Keep in refrigerator until cold, preferably overnight.

PIEAPPLE ICEBOX CAKE
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup pineapple juice
4 eggs
1 cup melted butter
2 cups conf. sugar
1 cup, dr., pineapple
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Melt sugar in pineapple juice, heat to scalding in double boiler, add beaten yolks to hot mixture, cook over water til thick and smooth. Cream butter, add conf. sugar and pineapple. Stir in cold cream butter and conf. sugar, add vanilla and 2 T. conf. sugar. Follow above directions to chill.

CHOCOLATE ICEBOX CAKE
2 dozen lady fingers
1/2 pound sweet chocolate
4 tablespoons sugar
4 tablespoons water
4 egg yolks
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
4 egg whites
1 cup cream, whipped.

Line pan with lady fingers, melt chocolate in double boiler, add sugar, water and egg yolks, beaten light. Cook, stirring until smooth. Add vanilla when cooled and beaten egg whites. Chill. May use sponge cake finger instead of lady fingers.
