Phone Hearing Ends; New Rate Plan Protested

Protest against an annual rate increase of \$4,123,000 sought by Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company was filed by Len Loring, representing the Oregon Telephone Union, at a hearing on the company's application here Saturday.

The hearing in progress since Tuesday, adjourned Saturday afternoon following the questioning of two company officials by Marion Rushing, deputy Portland city attorney, and attorneys for the Public Utilities commission. Under a law of the recent legislature Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg must release his order in the proceeding by June 1.

Protest of the Telephone Union was based largely on the alleged action of the Pacific company in ignoring an Oregon law relating to the training of apprentices.

Loring contended the company's failure to observe this law would deprive approximately 800 World War II veterans of this training.

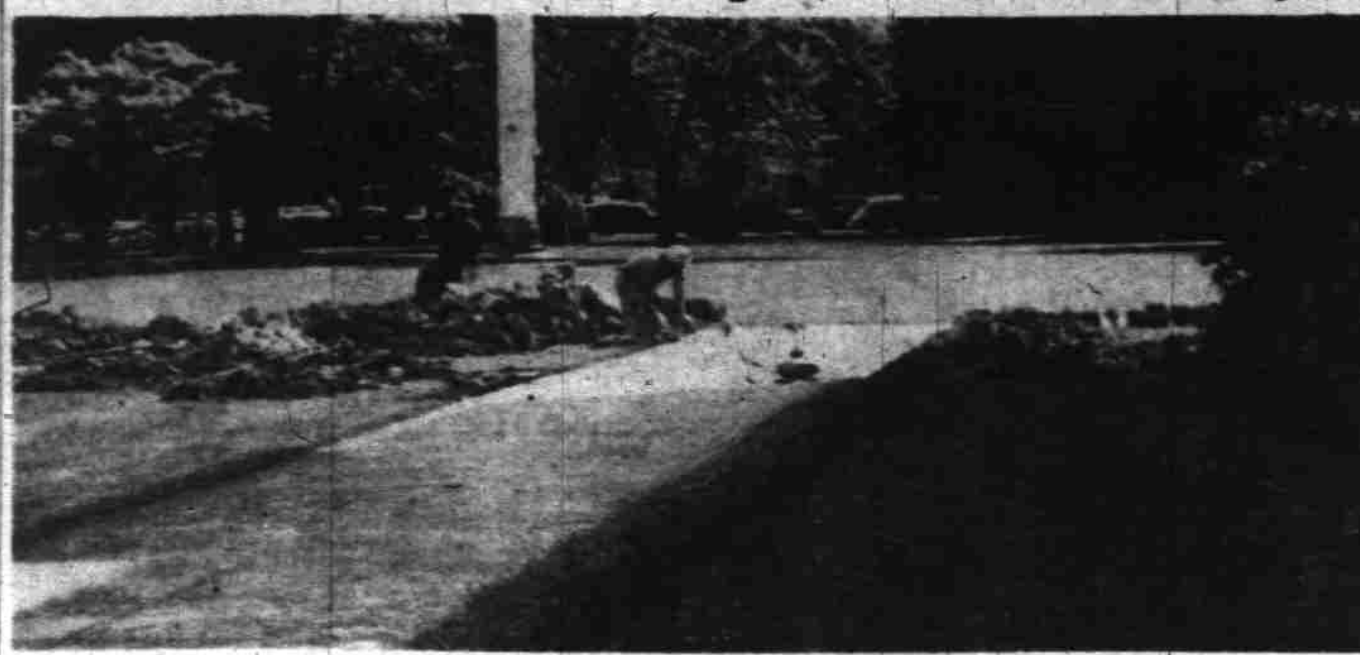

First National Bank to Open Trust Section

Opening Monday of a trust department office in Salem branch of First National Bank of Portland was announced Saturday by Guy N. Hickok, branch manager. In charge will be David G. Lloyd, coming from Portland, where he has been with the bank's trust department for 20 years.

Hickok credited increased demand for trust services for the decision to open the Salem office, which will serve Marion, Polk, Benton, Linn and Lincoln counties.

Salem Work in State Biennial Building Plans

New construction at state institutions in Salem and a new state office building in Portland will dominate Oregon's building program under the state board of control during the coming biennium. The board is preparing plans for use of appropriations made by the recent legislature.

One of the most outstanding projects included in the program involves the proposed state office building in Portland to cost approximately \$2,500,000, including the site. Roy E. Mills, board of control secretary, said approximately 20 sites both in west and east Portland have been submitted for consideration.

Board members have agreed to inspect a number of these sites within the next two or three weeks. Mills predicted that two years would be required to construct the building after the site has been selected and architects employed.

Other projects proposed by the board of control during the next two-year period include a new cell block at the state penitentiary and remodeling of the administration building and new dormitories at the state hospital. The recent legislature appropriated \$2,000,000 for state institutional construction during the biennium. An additional \$6,000,000 was appropriated for new construction at the higher education centers. The new appropriation of \$8,000,000 will come from the state's general fund.

Any construction under the recent appropriations, either by the state board of control or the state board of higher education, must receive approval of the state emergency board.

In addition the state highway commission is planning to erect its own office building here, probably to cost in excess of \$1,500,000. Funds probably will be raised through the issuance of bonds and be repaid over 10 to 20 years.

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Paper Explains Stock Brand Inspection Law

The importance of Oregon's new livestock brand inspection law, a product of the recent legislative session is being emphasized in a statement issued by the state department of agriculture.

Under this act movement of certain classes of livestock, including cattle, horses and mules, is now subject to the livestock identification and theft prevention law. The act was sponsored by a number of livestock organizations.

One of the major changes, M. E. Knickerbocker, chief of the animal division, state department of agriculture, said, makes application of the law statewide. Another new feature sets up a livestock advisory committee named by the governor and including one representative from the Western Oregon Livestock association, one from the Oregon Dairymen's association and three from the Oregon Cattlemen's association. The director of agriculture is ex-officio member of the committee.

All livestock moved in any manner to any place must be accompanied by a grand inspection certificate or a transportation certificate, with these exceptions:

If the movement is in course of regular ranch operations and on hoof within the state.
If the movement is of horses for handling, herding or trailing, livestock or for racing, showing, displaying or exhibiting within the state none is required.

Any person moving horses for purposes outlined must have in his or her possession evidence

Bad Weather Discontinues Aerial Search

PORTLAND, April 30.—(AP)—Aerial search for the Air force B-26 missing since April 21 was suspended today because of the weather after one plane was forced to land at Kelso, Wash.

Capt. Joseph Smith, air rescue service commander, ordered all planes in the air at the time to head for bases. Ground parties directed by Coast Guard Lt. Cmdr. R. W. Findley continued to search the sector northeast of Cougar, Wash.

Rain and low clouds virtually blanked visibility from the aircraft, Capt. Smith reported. Three men were aboard the plane that vanished as it approached Portland after a flight from Hamilton Field, Calif. The search took the life of another pilot Thursday on a mountain top near Vernonia, Ore. The body was recovered yesterday.

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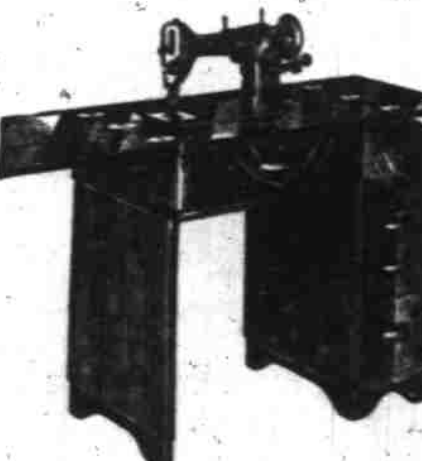
