Mrs. W. C. Frantz is district deputy grand chief and Mrs. Charles Bullock, district deputy secretary, both of Independence.

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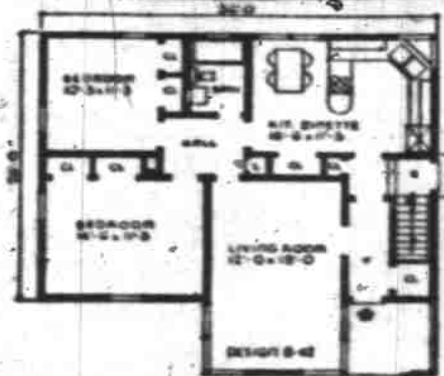
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
