

Cougar Oval Team Tops Oregon State

WSC's Notch 15 Straight Win; Pettersen Sets Record in Mile

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 30—(P)—Washington State won its 15th straight dual track meet here today, downing Oregon State, 85 1/2 to 44 1/2, on a track made slippery by continuous rain. One meet record was cracked, another tied despite the slippery footing.

Dick Peterson, Oregon State, beat Washington State's highly regarded duo of Bill Farrell and Dick Paeth in the home stretch of the mile to set a record of 4:19.6 minutes. The old mark was held by Eischen of Washington State in 4:21.4.

Dick Keniston, Washington State sprinter, tied the 100-yard dash mark of 10 seconds flat. There were two upsets. George Fullerton, Oregon State distance man, finished 15 yards ahead of Bob Seifridge, Washington State coast champion, in the two-mile event in 9:44.8 minutes, and Laurie Whitehead, Washington State 110 broad jumper, noted out Bob Laidlaw, Oregon State northern division champion, at 22 feet 4 1/2 inches.

Ducks Finish 4th Week Work

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, April 30—(Special)—Coach Jim Aiken's Oregon Ducks have finished their fourth week of spring football practice and the candidates for the 1949 team are slowly rounding into shape.

The Ducks are working only three days a week, but Aiken is following a policy of scrimmaging work for every man at each session. "We need tough work to get us ready for the fall, and only actual scrimmaging will get the job done," he says.

The big gaps left in the front line by graduation are the biggest problems facing the staff. Ends Dick Wilkins, Wayne Bartholmey and Dan Garza, Tackle Don Stanton, Guard Jim Berwick, Center Brad Ecklund and Guard Ted Melani are gone.

Another loss is Norm Van Brocklin, who decided to sign with the Los Angeles Rams rather than play his senior year of collegiate football. Three young passers, Earle Steile, Jim Calderwood and Joe Tom, are all in the fight to take over the first string spot. Coach Aiken says all three have possibilities.

In the line, Darrell Robinson and Les Hagen are operating at left end. Steve Dotur and Bob Roberts, veterans of last year, are back at left tackle. A sophomore, Gerald Moshinsky, and a transfer, Dick Gaudin, are running one-two at left guard. Dave Gibson and Dick Patrick seem set to replace Ecklund at center.

On the right side of the line, Ed Chrobot and Chet Daniels are back at guard. Sam Nevills and Gus Krickheim have moved into the right tackle slot and Bob Anderson and Lou Robinson have taken over at end.

In the backfield, Halfbacks Joe Lewis, George Bell and Johnny McKay are returning.

Sophomore Chuck Miasfeldt is currently rounding out the top four. And at fullback, Bob Sanders and DeWayne Johnson are again at hand.

Aiken says, "We'll be a tough club to whip."

Lebanon Airmen Model Plane For Flights To Fishin' Spots

LEBANON — In the spring a fisherman's fancy turns lightly to remote fishing holes that are far beyond the reach of bipeds or the endurance of an ordinary mortal; in other words, where you can use wings.

Research among veteran fishermen has brought forth much interesting data on the fishing in this locality. All possible landing sites by lakes and streams are being investigated where roads are non-existent or impassable until much later in the year. An effort is being made to make Lebanon the aerial gateway for fishing in the Cascades.

In line with this, the boys at Cascade Airways have been busy transforming a Piper J-3 Cub into a powerful little bear. The result is a J-3 Cub with an 85 horsepower engine and a self starter. The airplane is designed to be used as an aerial "leap to get in and out of small places to explore the remote fishing spots this spring. It can land or take off in 200 feet. A tandem wheel arrangement is being installed. This little bear looks innocent from the outside but its performance is sensational in those inaccessible places.

Cubs are known to be inquisitive little creatures, and, if the propped snout of this one uncovers some extra fine fishing spots, many fishermen will benefit in the saving of time and energy in getting to the scene of their favorite sport.
