

Conference Of Nazarenes Opened Here

Over 400 ministers and members of the Oregon district of the Church of the Nazarene are assembled in Salem this week for the annual conference of churches from the western section of Oregon.

Dr. Samuel Young, of Boston, Mass., general superintendent, is presiding at the assembly which opened Wednesday in Salem's Nazarene church.

The assembly convened with a business session. Dr. Young spoke on "The Missionary Challenge of a Post War Church" drawing on his recent experience on a trip to South America. Gov. Douglas McKay greeted the visiting ministers and the Rev. L. T. Anderson welcomed them in behalf of the Salem Ministerial association. District Superintendent Weaver W. Hess and Dr. Young responded.

Election of district officers will take place today. The assembly closes Friday with ordination ceremonies. A Sunday school rally was held Wednesday night at the church and a Home Missionary rally will take place tonight. The Rev. George Taylorson of Spokane, Wash., spoke last night and will talk again tonight.

Berry Growers Predict Low Yield for Crops

Winter damage this year to Boysen and Young berry vines in the Willamette valley is expected to reduce the crop by 30 to 40 per cent below normal while California crops took an estimated 20 per cent frost loss.

These estimates were made at a meeting Wednesday night here of local berry growers and a group of California growers. Five California growers surveyed crop damage here during the past several days to compare with data from their own state.

The five, who are leaving today for California, include Sidney Smith of Modesto, president of the California Berry Growers exchange; James Moller of Tulare; George Murphy of Denair; Joseph Ferrero of Merced, vice president of the exchange; and H. G. Menke of Merced, manager.

Following field trips Tuesday and Wednesday they met last night with officers of the Oregon Cane Fruit Control Board, Inc., and a few local growers.
