

Circus Day in Salem Today! (Scout Model)

It's circus day in Salem — Boy Scout variety!

A parade through downtown streets this afternoon with floats, bands from Keizer school and Leslie and Parrish junior high schools, and nearly 3,000 marching scouts will precede the United States flag in a parade for 7:30 p.m. at Sweetland field.

The circus, sponsored by Salem Lions club, is an annual event featuring Boy Scouts of Polk, Linn and Marion counties.

The parade forms at Marion square about 4 p.m. before its scheduled 4 p.m. departure. Route is south on Commercial street, east on State street to Liberty north to Court, east to High, south to State, and east to Sweetland field.

A supper for all participating scouts will be provided at the field by the Lions club.

U.S. Denies Red Charge of Deal with Spain

LAKE SUCCESS, May 6.—(AP)—The United States denied today a Russian and Polish charge that Americans are building air and military bases in Spain.

It was the shortest and strongest statement of American policy on Spain made so far in the United Nations assembly in the three years. Generalissimo Franco has been an issue before the U.N.

Ray A. Thompson, U.S. delegate, told the 48-nation political committee of the U.N. assembly that:

"Despite assertions to the contrary, we have no military alliance with Spain, we have given no military assistance to Spain, no military or naval missions are maintained in Spain."

Thompson's reply was short and snappy in contrast to the 40-minute blast today by Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet deputy foreign minister, and by Julius Katz-Suchy, of Poland, yesterday.

Gromyko said Americans are trying to take over Mercury and Uranium mines in Spain "in line with their desire to take over all raw materials in the world connected with the production of atomic energy."

Recruit Office Status Drops

PORTLAND, May 6.—(AP)—The Oregon district of the army and air force recruiting service is only a subdivision now.

In an economy measure, the district was placed under a larger "northern recruiting district," headquartered at Seattle and embracing the former Oregon, Washington and Montana districts. Col. Charles O. Moody, Seattle, is in general command.

Col. Raymond Hay will remain in Portland as commanding officer of the Portland office and its nine branches: At The Dalles, Salem, Pendleton, Astoria, Longview, Walla Walla, Centralia, Pasco and Yakima.

U.S. May Give Japan Foreign Policy Powers

WASHINGTON, May 6.—(AP)—The United States today proposed giving the Japanese government more power over its international relations as a step toward restoring Japan eventually to the family of nations.

A formal state department policy declaration said that if Japan is given limited responsibilities in several international fields it would speed the defeated country's economic recovery and help prepare it for the end of the occupation.

The specific fields suggested included trade promotion, citizenship and property problems, cultural relations, and technical and scientific arrangements and exchanges.

This further unfolding of American policy came in an explanation of a new state department proposal to the 11-nation Far Eastern commission. The United States urged that the Japanese be authorized to take part in international conferences, provided Gen. Douglas MacArthur approved.

Already MacArthur, as supreme allied commander, is turning over to the Japanese government increasing responsibility for domestic affairs.

Union School Board Ballot Set June 20

INDEPENDENCE.—Selection of three new board members for Monmouth-Independence school district is set for Monday, June 20.

Two must be from Monmouth area and the third at large from the district, since the two hold-over members, Dr. C. A. Fratzke and Rev. Walker, are both from Independence. By agreement of the two boards before consolidation of the new Monmouth members will have three- and five-year terms and the member at large four years.

The new election procedure, since the district is now first class, includes filing of candidacy petitions signed by at least 10 qualified voters seven days before the election and acceptance by the candidate at least five days prior to the election. Each petition is to state which term the candidate is seeking.

Matching Wits with the Cow Takes More Finesse Than's Expected

ROLLING HILLS FARM—Ten acres isn't big enough to hold two strong minded females.

I've just had another bout with Queen. All winter she's been outsmarting us, simply walking out of her pasture at will but I'm sharp in the Spring. Of course she has one advantage, there's plenty of time, as she chews her cud, to make plans for surmounting all the difficulties I put between her and the great big wonderful outside world.

This seems to more than offset my college education, which of course she has none of, not even a degree from a cow college. But Queen is a natural fence getter-over, and as we found out after buying her, she comes from a long line of girls who can't be kept within the bounds of a fence. Her mother was a noted gate opener and fence climber, while her full sister (like Queen, half Hereford), "climbs anything, and doesn't even notice there's been a fence there."

When we first got her, Bossy had some respect for an electric wire, but none whatever for a rail fence, such as terminates Rolling Hills farm to the west, or the regulation, woven wire affair which we put up exclusively for her, around the barnyard. With some six acres of land to graze in, she much prefers the neighbor's newly plowed field, where there's nothing whatever to eat.

The rail fence she simply climbs, but on the wire fence she uses another system. (I find it great fun watching her carry out the campaign she's been planning during rest and cud-chewing periods.)

Putting her head over the four foot wire fencing, she slowly but firmly pushes down, ostensibly trying to reach an imaginary wisp of grass from the other side. Then when the fence is sufficiently broken down, she steps over, the wire springs back up and looks only slightly mashed, not a bit like a cow had climbed it.

Queen also has a way with gates. Mine are now all wired shut, and I intend to keep the wire cutters out of her reach. She puts her horns between the rails on one, and raises it slowly then drops it. This should do one of two things, either she'll get the wire loop up over the fence post, or eventually the gate will break to pieces.

But back to the electric fence. Another miracle of modern life is the single strand of wire, which keeps even adventurous cattle at a respectable distance. They'll walk all over a well put up wire mesh fence, but stay plenty far away from that single strand draped carelessly on a few insulated posts.

But not so Queenie.
