### A little bit about music

The New York Times on Sunday, May 1, paid tribute to Salem's Community orchestra which, under the direction of Frank Fisher, played a concert at the high school auditorium in March. J. Gordon Thornton of Salem is the author and unofficial publicist for the orchestra.

Commenting on the interest of Oregonians in instrumental music, the article under the heading of "From the Mail Pouch" declares that there are fifteen local orchestras within a land strip of less than 100 miles down the middle of the Willamette Valley.

"The debut of the Salem Community orchestra in March," the article says, "brings this total to 15 symphony sized organizations which should set the pace for the rest of the country."

"In Salem's case, much of the credit for this must go to a dynamic young man named Frank Fisher, professor of music at Willamette university, which boasts one of the largest and most active music schools in the west."

"Inspired by the city's response to his Willamette orchestra, Mr. Fisher started in October, 1948, to form the Salem Community orchestra. This group of able instrumentalists drawn from every part of the city, plays for nothing — or, perhaps we should say, for love. At any rate, there are no salaries and there was no admission charge for the first concert in March.

"Free admission does not necessarily attract people to concerts (we recall quantities of passes given for Town Hall and Carnegie debuts that never did more than fill the first few rows) and the ovation accorded the new orchestra and its conductor demonstrated that the genuine interest in symphonic music is apparent in Oregon today."
