## Married Couples May Revise State Tax Returns, Get Refund

Because a large number of Oregon married couples this year have overpaid their state income tax for 1948, the tax commission has amended its regulations to allow correction of returns in certain cases. Commissioner Earl Fisher announced Saturday.

The new rule is designed to make it possible for husbands and wives who filed "joint returns" to take advantage of the combined separate return form where the latter method results in less tax. Such corrections must be filed in appended returns with the commission not later than July 15, 1949.

Officials said the Oregon community property law made it possible for married couples to split their 1948 income evenly, thus enjoying the tax saving effected by keeping their income in lower tax brackets.

A sampling of returns filed has led the commission to believe, members said, that many of the 1948 joint returns mailed up to April 15 of this year resulted in tax payments substantially in excess of those required by the combined separate return. It is further evident, the commissioners added, that taxpayers were misled by the use of the federal form in which joint filing resulted in a lesser tax. This confusion will be obviated in the future because the recent legislature provided for splitting income in a joint return, similar to the federal method.

Married taxpayers are urged to examine the retained copies of their 1948 returns. If all income reported was lumped together, using but one column of the return, it is probable that a joint return was made, the commissioners said. In such cases, the taxpayers were asked to try splitting the income in the two columns labeled husband and wife, dividing the amounts equally, in order to take advantage of the lower tax rates which this method provides. If a lesser tax is thus found due an amended return may be filed.

The commission stressed that this extraordinary relief measure is limited to the 1948 returns and the election must be acted on not later than July 15.
