Bloodmobile To Pay Fourth Visit to County

The Red Cross bloodmobile from the Portland regional blood center comes to Salem Tuesday, for its fourth visitation to the county, starting work at 10 a. m. in First Methodist church.

Goal of the local committee is at least 100 pints, on each visit of the bloodmobile, because the fewer the donors the higher the cost to the Red Cross per pint in maintaining this program and because otherwise Marion county will not have enough blood turned here for its use, said Milton L. Meyers, local blood program chairman. Blood donated here is taken to the Portland center for processing, then is returned here to be on hand at local hospitals for free use to all in need of it.

Those signed to donate next Tuesday were asked to keep their appointments or cancel in time to enable the committee to sign up a substitute.

They may eat fruit or fruit juices, jam, marmalade, honey, preserves, dry toast or crackers, and may have tea or coffee with sugar but without cream.

A period of eight weeks must elapse between donations.
