

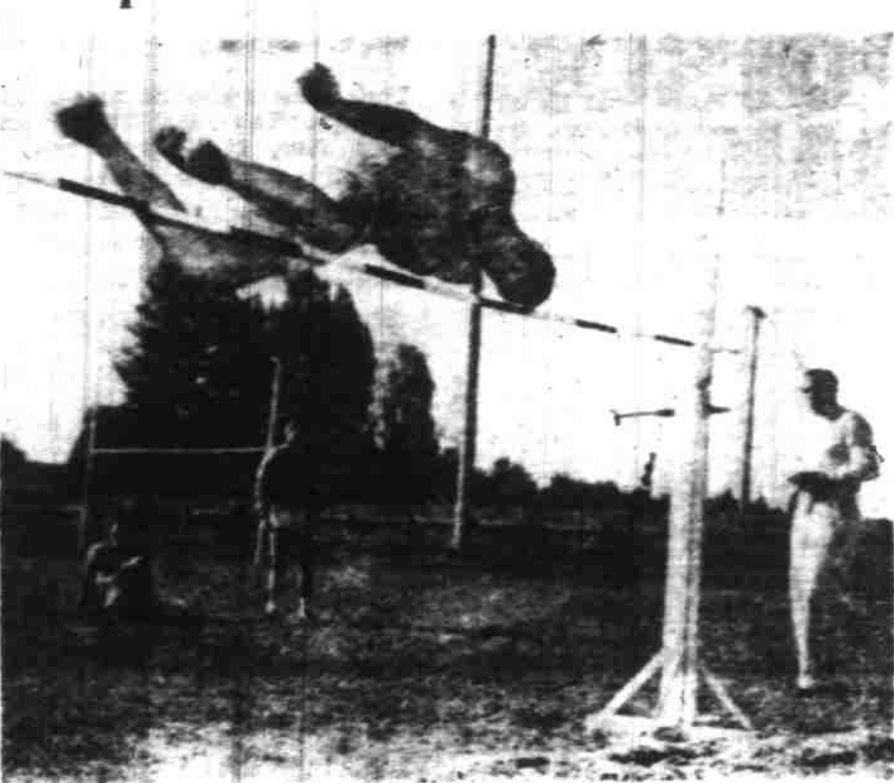
# Springfield Wins Big-6 Oval Title

## Salem 2nd; Four Records Notched; Covalt, Relay Men Ring Up Marks

BELL FIELD, Corvallis, May 7—(Special)—Springfield high schoolers today won the Big-Six league track and field title by scoring 611 1/4 points in a fast-moving conclave that saw four meet records go flying. Salem's Vikings placed second with 45 1/2 points, Bend third at 30, Albany fourth at 28, Corvallis fifth at 24 and Eugene sixth at 21 1/2.

The four records came in the 440 yard relay, javelin and 880 yard relay. Salem's Sophomore Buzz Covalt rambled to the quarter mile mark in the sharp time of 5:15. He also ran a lap on Salem's record-establishing relay team which scooted to a 1:33 time. Tom Bridges, Ron Hall and Jim Jensen joined Covalt in this one.

# Bearcat Cindermen Defeated By Lewis & Clarks, 85 1/2-45 1/2

PORTLAND, May 7—(P)—Lewis and Clark college bagged nine first places and tied for another to score 85 1/2 points and win a dual Northwest conference track meet today from Willamette university. The Bearcats scored 45 1/2 points, of which Ted Mertz got 14 to take individual honors for the day. He won both hurdle races and tied for first in the high jump.

Merlin White, Lewis and Clark, won the 100 yard sprint in 10 seconds flat and the 220. The other pioneer double winner was Ray Cramer in shot put and discus.

# Horse Show Winds Up Conclave Today

## Thirteen Events Listed on Card For Finale at Fairgrounds Arena

The Willamette Valley Horseman's Association fifth annual horse show at the fairgrounds pavilion will conclude its two-day run with 13 more events today. The opening day of the conclave was still going before a large crowd, late last night.

The events, topped by the Grand Entry from 2 to 2:15 p. m. today, are as follows: Bareback broncs, stake bending, pleasure horses, matched calf roping, drill, kids' roping scramble, obstacle race, matched pairs for Westerns, matched calf roping, stock horse eliminations, flag race and wild cow milking. Those were the events Saturday also.

Many riding groups from near and far in Oregon will be in the competition. The show is sponsored by the Association, the Oregon Mounted Posse and the Salem Saddle Club. It has drawn over 100 spectators from as far away as John Day, Oregon, and part of Southern Washington.

Saturday's events were started off at 10:30 a. m. with a downtown parade.

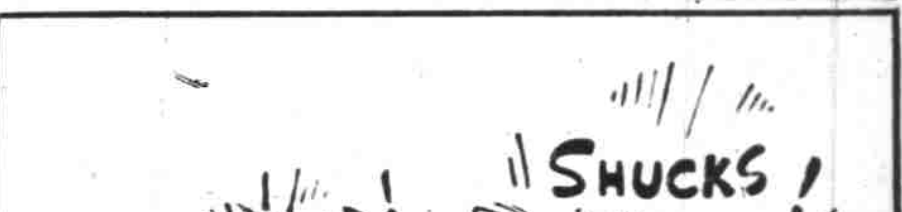
