Brown, Nichols Are Selected

Both Great Pitchers Of Game's Early Days

NEW YORK, May 8-(A)-Mordecai Peter (three finger) Brown and Charles A. (Kid) Nichols, two great pitchers of the past, today joined 56 others of the baseball immortals in the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N. Y. The two righthanded hurlers

vere elected by the permanent baseball Hall of Fame committee for baseball's highest honor-the 15th and 16th pitchers to earn the distinction.

Brown, who gained his fame with the Chicago cubs in the early part of the century, died last February 14, at the age of 72,

Nichols, now 79, compiled an amazing record with the Boston National league in the last decade of the 19th century. From 1890, when he joined Boston, to 1899, won at least 21 games each year and for seven consecutive seasons -1891 to 1897 - he notched at least 30 victories.

A workhorse on the mound, he spent most of his major league career with Boston, winding up with a record of 360 triumphs and 202 defeats. A native of Madison, Wis. Nichols now lives at 721 Velentine Road in Kansas City,

Brown, nicknamed "three finger' because he had lost two fingers of his right hand in an accident, won his fame with the Chicago Cubs of the Frank Chance nati in 1913, jumped to the "outlaw" Federal league for two seasons, then then came back to the
