

Polk Fruit Fly Program Plans Being Made Soon

Polk county operators of spraying and dusting equipment are asked to meet Monday, May 16 at 8 p. m. in the county extension office in Dallas to discuss the 1949 cherry fruit fly control program.

N. John Hansen, Polk county extension agent, states that the meeting is called for the purpose of discussing plans for complete control of cherry fruit fly. Polk county is included in the cherry fruit fly control program, which provides for compulsory spraying or dusting of all cherry trees. This program is administered by the state department of agriculture.

Hansen states that it is still too early to spray for fruit fly control. Notices will be sent to all cherry growers when the fruit fly emerges. Any person who has not received spray notices in previous years is asked to contact the county extension office and their names will be added to the cherry spray list.

Guernsey Spring Event Plans Made

Marion and Polk county Guernsey breeders have completed plans for the annual spring show at the state fairgrounds in Salem, Saturday, May 21. All Oregon adult and junior Guernsey breeders with purebreds are eligible to come to the show.

Animals may be brought in on Friday night, May 20, and a watchman will remain in charge all night. Showing of the 4-H and FFA heifers will start at 9 a. m. Lunch will be served at noon by the Ricker Garden club. Cattle tested for tuberculosis and Bangs disease before March 31 should be tested again. Test reports and registration papers must be brought along for all animals excepting those too young or in transfer.

Gain in Income Of Poultry Shown

Gross income from Oregon's poultry industry last year totaled \$43,111,000 and was 6 per cent higher than in 1947, reports Noel Bennion, extension poultry specialist. The figure is based on latest U. S. department of agriculture reports.

Income from the sale of baby chicks, poult, hatching eggs or brooding stock is not included in the gross income figure. A breakdown of \$43,111,000 total includes \$21,500,000 from sale of eggs, \$13,985,000 from turkeys, \$4,863,000 from chickens and \$1,562,000 from broilers. The poultry industry normally accounts for about 10 per cent of the state's agricultural income, Bennion states.

Grass Silage to Be Topic of Discussion

Marion county grass silage field day will be held Monday, May 18, at the H. A. Barnes & Sons ranch on the Cascade highway. Demonstrations will start at 10 a. m. reports Ben A. Newell.

Use of the grass silage method of storage of forage crops is gaining favor rapidly throughout western Oregon as well as in Marion county. Newell states. Tests have proved conclusively that grass silage is second best to actual pasture from the standpoint of feed value. Equipment is taking the hard labor out of hay and grass silage making, he adds.

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Steel Demand Shoves Stock Mart Prices

NEW YORK, May 11—(AP)—A flurry of demand for steel shares stiffened the price structure in the stock market today.

Interest in steels suddenly perked up in mid-morning and for a while it seemed likely that a full-scale rally was in the cards. Buying forces soon ran out of fuel, though. Numerous stocks fell back a bit from the highs of the day and for the balance of the session the market just about managed to maintain headway.

Gains of fractions to around a point were liberally distributed at the final bell although most issues closed under the best.

A slight increase in volume accompanied the expansion in demand. Sales amounted to 790,000 shares compared with 720,000 Tuesday.

Crop Forecast Booms Grains

CHICAGO, May 11—(AP)—Rye scored sharp gains on the board of trade today, featuring an other-wise steady but not spectacular market. The advance in rye reflected an agriculture department forecast for a small crop this year.

Wheat ended 1/4 cent higher, rye corn was 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, oats were unchanged to 1/2 higher, rye was 5 to 5 1/2 higher, soybeans were 1 1/2 to 2 cents higher and lard was 7 to 20 cents a hundred pounds higher.

May wheat again paced bread cereal contracts, reaching \$2.24 1/2. At that point it had recovered all the ground lost in the sharp break on April 28.
