

## Foods, Dairies Division Ends Work Program Conference

Fieldmen and specialists of the division of foods and dairies, state agricultural department, Wednesday concluded a two-day meeting called to reassess their work program and determine how to carry on their regulatory work in the most efficient manner.

O. K. Beals, division chief, assisted by his assistants in the central office, conducted the conference.

The conference dealt largely with assignment of work, cost, efficiency and regularity of service in connection with new laws administered by the division, including the fluid milk act, weights and measures law, ice cream measure, and amended egg act. Some time also was devoted to routine matters involving inspections of grocery stores, carbonated beverages and feeds, and fertilizer and economic poisons.

The new law relating to grades and standards for fluid milk is now effective.

E. L. Peterson, agricultural department director, emphasized that his office cannot undertake any activity not specifically authorized by law. He pointed out that employees perform their greatest service in informing the public as to its responsibilities under the laws and the extent of the service the department is authorized to perform.

"I am proud of the men who represent this department," Peterson said, "and of the fine work they are doing."

C. W. Smith, Corvallis, associate director of extension service, was a special guest Wednesday. He stressed the need for united efforts in re-emphasizing quality production to the end that farmers may regain the ground lost during the war and postwar seller's market. Smith praised the fine relations he said existed between Oregon State college and the state department of agriculture.

## Cloverdale to Play Host to 4-H Meeting

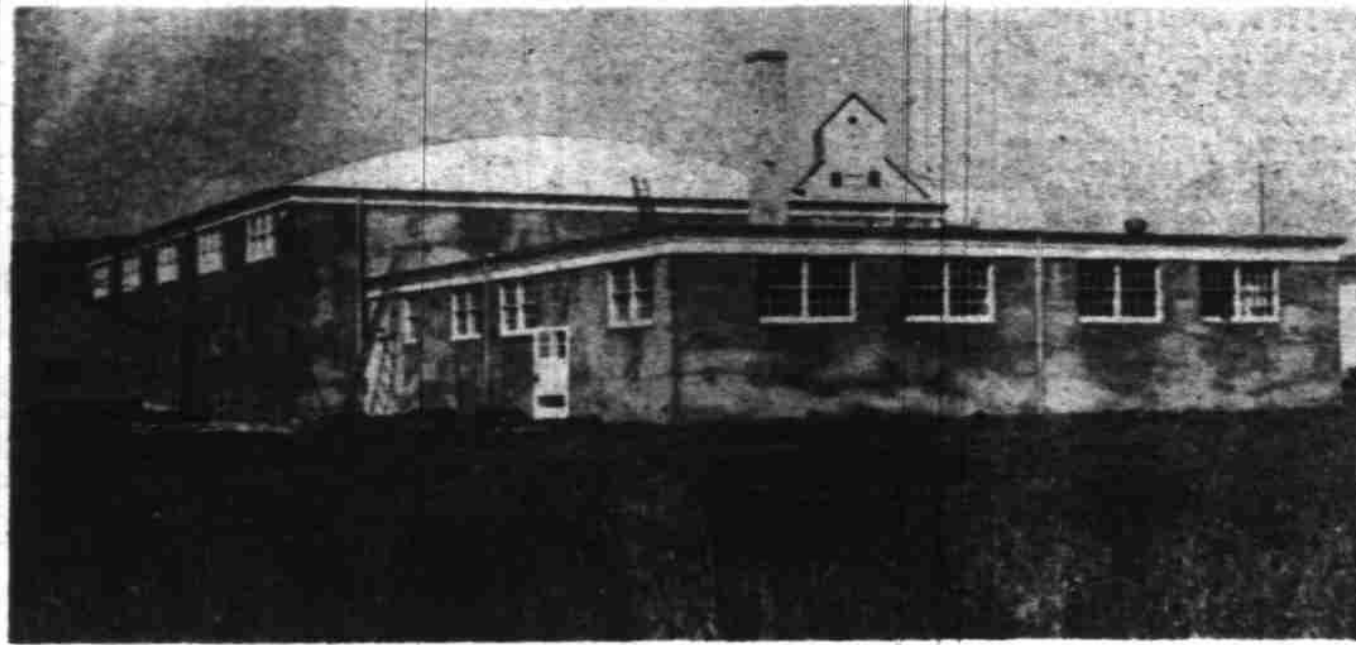

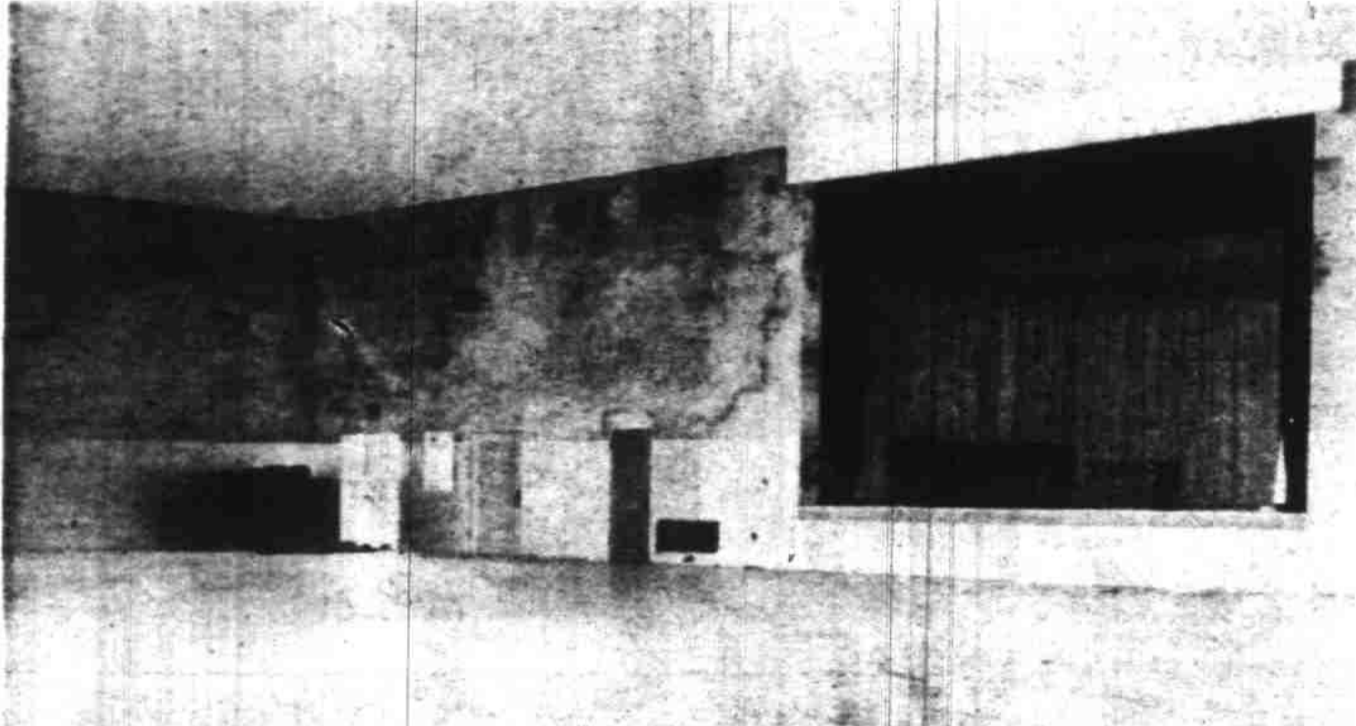
