Rotarians Tour Cold Storage Plant; Sample Frozen Foods

Salem Rotarians were like a bunch of school boys playing hockey Wednesday as they took a luncheon "excursion" to the Terminal Ice and Cold Storage company plant. After sampling some foods which had been frozen and hearing about the facilities, they toured the plant to see its operation and potential.

The club members ate standing at tables or from lap-balanced plates in a huge cooler-freezer room which in a few weeks will be crammed with food products of the Willamette valley.

Speaker was Lowell Kerp, Portland, former manager here and now executive vice president and general manager of the firm. He said the local plant is one of the coast's largest under one roof, with a daily capacity of 750 tons. He termed last year's addition of 650,000 cubic feet of storage space an expression of confidence in Salem and the valley.

Exhibits ranged from sweet-looking barrels of strawberries frozen solid to the killing and dressing of turkeys. Railroad cars and trucks specially equipped for transporting frozen goods were also on display.

The tour included quick-freeze chambers which provided relief from the hot day, momentarily, but soon proved chillier than most members desired.

Arrangements were handled by Harold D. Robertson, plant manager.
