Hop markets were comparatively steady during the month ended May 17 with prices averaging about unchanged actording to reports to the market news service of the department of agriculture. While supplies held by dealers and brewers remain ample, dealers were showing some interest in spot 1948 crop hops for immediate-

delivery during the past week. Some of the poores lots went for as low as 20 cents in the Salem area but most of the small amounts sold went for from 26 to 29 cents, W. Paulus of Williams and Hart, reported Tuesday.

Trading in the 1949 crop contract market was only moderately active with growers in the Pacific Northwest showing somewhat of a holding tendency for higher values. 
