

# Hop Prices Remain Unchanged, Supplies Ample, Survey Shows

Hop markets were comparatively steady during the month ended May 17, with prices averaging about unchanged according to reports to the market news service of the department of agriculture.

While supplies held by dealers and brewers remain ample, dealers were showing some interest in spot 1948 crop hops for immediate delivery during the past week. Some of the poorer lots went for as low as 20 cents in the Salem area but most of the small amounts sold went for 26 to 29 cents.

Trading in the 1949 crop contract market was only moderately active with growers in the Pacific Northwest showing somewhat of a holding tendency for higher values. Inactivity increased toward the close of last week when a very few contracts were made at 48 cents per pound, basis 6 per cent leaf and stem pick. The figure "dried up" by Tuesday however, Mr. Paulus stated, and contracts were offered at a 47 cent price.

Weather conditions have been quite satisfactory for the coming crop. Paul T. Rowell of the United Hop Growers, stated Tuesday, that winter weather brought growth but at about the same time a year ago. Darning for mildew control has been underway for sometime. Approximately 160 tons of dust have been disposed of by handlers to Oregon growers so far this year, and several growers reported dusting from time to time already. A little mildew infection, creeping out late last week with the unseasonably warm weather, brought dusting equipment out rapidly.

While figures on hop acreage removed in the state were not completed Tuesday, Mr. Rowell said that 2,400 acres are definitely in production and that some 150 new or replaced acres were in. There are, however, some "doubtful" set and the complete survey will not be ready until early in June, Mr. Rowell expected. His estimates were that there would be a little more than 15,000 acres in the state compared to the 15,000 in 1948.

Yields of hops by domestic growers during March was the largest for that month in recent years and amounted to 3,377,256 pounds or about 7 per cent greater than in March 1948. March usage this year, however, brought the total for the season beginning September 1 up to 20,654,377 pounds compared with 22,900,928 pounds during the corresponding 7 months last season and 23,039,082 pounds the season 2 years before.

United States exports of hops during March were well maintained and totaled 1,214,476 pounds which brought the September-March total to 13,584,000 pounds compared with 10,232,723 pounds during the same months a year ago and 10,194,293 pounds during the 1946-47 crop year. March exports included 453,694 pounds to Mexico, 291,651 pounds to Brazil, 131,584 pounds to Canada, 66,195 pounds to Uruguay, 44,067 pounds to Columbia, and the remainder in smaller lots to other areas.

United States hop imports for the month of March amounted to 485,908 pounds and included 280,945 pounds from Germany, 199,638 pounds from Czechoslovakia and 5,325 pounds from the United Kingdom. March imports brought the total since September 1 up to 3,117,782 pounds compared with 1,542,154 pounds during the corresponding period last year and 3,123,110 pounds the same period two years ago.

## Stocks Decline After Splurge

NEW YORK, May 17 (AP)—The stock market ran out of buying power today after a five-day running advance.

Declines in fractions to around a point were in a clear-cut majority at the final bell. Among the latter were some of the utility stocks which climbed to new highs for 1949 yesterday.

A handful of other utilities kept on going to new highs with gains of fractions to around .2 points. Trading volume contracted to 780,000 shares from yesterday's 1,030,000.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dipped 2 1/2 points to 63.8, the first setback since May 10. The industrial group showed the largest loss, followed by railroad stocks. The utility division was unchanged.

## Budget Chief Appointment Expected Soon

Persons close to Gov. Douglas McKay said Tuesday he may announce selection of a state budget director to succeed the late George Aiken within the next two weeks.

Verne Young, deputy state budget director, and Ernest Fatland of Ceidon have been mentioned as appointees. Fatland previously served in both the house of representatives and the state senate. His only opposition is said to be spearheaded by O. B. Robertson, Junction City, and for years a regular visitor in the lobby of the Oregon state legislature.

Young handled the budget department during Aiken's illness. A report also has circulated that the governor may ask Fred Paulus, chief deputy in the state treasury department, to accept the job.

Friends of Paulus said, however, he probably would not be interested in such an offer.

## Wife of Former WU Dean Dies In California

The death of Mrs. Harriett S. Erickson, wife of a former dean at Willamette university, was learned here Tuesday. She died Monday at Santa Barbara, Calif., where she lived since leaving Salem in 1940.

Her husband, Frank M. Erickson, became head of the department of education at Willamette university in 1920, and was dean of the university from 1925 until 1940.

## Cherrymen Set Fruit Fly Talks

A meeting of spray contractors, cannery fieldmen and others interested in cherry fruit fly control in Marion county has been scheduled by county extension agent D. L. Rasmussen for Thursday, May 19, at 8 p. m. (daylight saving time) in room 223 of the Salem postoffice.

Plans for the 1949 compulsory spray or disk program will be reviewed. Recommended insecticides and timing of applications will be discussed during the meeting.

Cooperating agencies and their responsibilities in the current program are the Oregon state department of agriculture; regulatory; Oregon experiment station, insecticides and timing; and Oregon extension service, publicity.

Jack Turnbull, deputy horticultural inspector, has been assigned to Marion county by the state department of agriculture for the duration of the cherry fruit fly control program. Turnbull will be at the meeting Thursday night to outline his work in cherry fruit fly control.
