SECRETS OF CHARM

So much of the grace of your figure depends on knowing how to manage your arms. Here's how:

When she thinks all eyes are on her, almost any girl or woman has a tendency to disintegrate into parts. And then she has a hard time determining just what to do with any of the parts!

A number of young models just learning their business confess their concern over their arms. They tell me that they just don't know what to do with them. That's a terrible state of affairs, since arms can be one of woman's special graces. And since they are something every woman has it behooves every woman to make sure that they are a grace.

Do your elbows always seem to be the pointed end of a sharp angle? Do your arms always move in jerky, disjointed gestures? Do you think of your arms as a couple of sticks that just connect your hands to your shoulders and allow you to move them around? Would you like to see those jerky movements, points and sticks blend themselves into fluid, rounded lines of grace and easy motion?

The First Secret
If so, this is for you—the Powers Girls way.

The first secret lies in managing your arms so that they always look as though they really do belong to you and are part of your body. Too often arms look like grotesque, dangling appendages that have recently been tacked on loosely by a careless carpenter.

Keep your arms close to your body when you are standing. Put one arm slightly in front of your body. Rest it on your hip bone. Relax your elbow and turn your hand so that the thumb side is outward and your little finger touches your dress. Place the other arm slightly behind you and touching your body. You'll notice immediately how much softer the contour of your arms appears—how relaxed they seem to the rest of you!

Controlling the Swing
Of course, when you're walking your arms swing in rhythm with your body. Just be sure they don't swing too far—it will give you an uncharming masculine look. Allow your arms to swing only as far as the length of your step. Your step must be the length of your foot. That's an easy rule, isn't it?

Now if you wonder where your arms should be when you are seated, the problem is easily solved. Simply place your hands together in your lap—the back of one hand on your thigh and the back of the other hand in the other palm. Now that your palms are turned up, relax your fingers so that they curl slightly. Keep a little space between your body and your elbows to let your waist appear slim.

These natural positions are easy on your arms... easy on other's eyes too.
