

Senators Win Second Game, Take Twin Bill

A three-run home run in the fifth inning by Mel Wasley. Wee Jimmy Foster's effective pitching and four Spokane errors joined forces in the second game of last night's doubleheader at Waters field to give the Salem Senators an 8-4 victory and a sweep of the doubleheader. The Senators won the opener 2-1 (details in today's sports section).

The wins were Salem's fifteenth and sixteenth of the season and strengthened the Senators' bid to overtake the Western International league leading Yakima Cubs. Foster's win, a seven-hitter, was his third of the season. Four Spokane pitchers, three of them named Bill Beard's crew. Starter Orrin Baker, a former Coast leaguer with Los Angeles, was the first. Wasley's home run came off Southpaw Lee Howard. Larry Barton, former Portland Beaver first baseman, hit a homer for Spokane with no one on base in the sixth. The two homers were the first of the 1949 season at Waters field. In tonight's first game of the Spokane-Salem series, starting at 7:30 p.m. in order to allow the visiting Indians a chance to catch a plane. Bus Sporer will be on the mound for Salem, against Dick Baird of Spokane.

Commission Approves Highway Improvement

Among other projects approved were three Salem-Silverton highway improvements aggregating \$425,000. These call for asphalt concrete surfacing, for a Pudding river bridge and an overpass. Also on the list are a \$60,000 bridge over the Little Luckiamute on Kings valley highway in Polk county, a \$320,000 resurfacing of McMinnville area highway and a \$125,000 six-mile stretch of asphaltic concrete in Sweet Home area.

Private Forest Lands Planted With Seedlings

PORTLAND. (Special) More than 12,000 acres of non-stocked private forest lands of western Washington and Oregon were planted with nursery-grown seedlings from November through mid-May in the largest reforestation project in the region's history, according to N. E. Bjorklund, forester in charge of the Forest Industries Tree nursery at Nisqually. The unique tree nursery shipped 6,735,000 year-old baby trees, Bjorklund said, largest in its seven-year history. In addition to those shipped, 250,000 Douglas fir trees, 700,000 Noble fir seedlings and 100,000 white and Norway spruce will be carried over to make two-year-old stock.

The state of Oregon planted 680 acres of private forest land with 375,000 seedlings and farmers and small land owners planted 130 acres with 70,000 trees. In addition more than 325,000 trees were given to small owners by the Crown-Zellerbach corporation, Weyerhaeuser Timber company and West Coast Lumbermen's association.

Stores Plan Fall Opening

Salem merchants are planning a "fall opening" event similar to the recent spring opening. It was reported to the Salem Chamber of Commerce board of directors Wednesday night by James R. Beard, Retail Trade bureau chairman.

Beard said possibility of another "treasure hunt" feature is doubtful because of a recent ruling by District Attorney E. O. Stadler on lotteries. In the recent event merchants gave out tickets and later posted prize merchandise in their windows bearing numbers to correspond with some of the tickets.

Other plans brought before the board are for summertime luncheons for new members of the chamber and for a chamber visitation to coast communities June 9.
